### Attends School Principals' Meet

"Elementary School Problems of Mass Education" were evaluated by a nationally-known educator at the annual conference of Michigan Elementary School Principals at Michigan State University April 12 and 13.

Donald Hossler, principal of the Ten Mile Elementary School, served as recorder for the study group on "Evaluating the Guidance Program" at the conference.

Dr. Henry H. Hill, president, Peabody College for Teachers in Nashville, Tennessee, gave the keynote address at the Thursday evening banquet.

"Better Evaluation for Better Elementary Schools" was the theme for the conference, which drew approximately 400 to Kellogg Center.

The relationship between the elementary school and the community were evaluated, along with curriculum, teacher and growth, guidance, techniques and materials, and training programs.

The MSU College of Education joined with the Department of Elementary School Principals of the Michigan Education Association to sponsor the program.

### Catalogue 3,000th Book At Library

The Farmington Senior High Library has catalogued the 3,000th book added to the Senior High Library since it opened in 1953.

This number is two thirds more than the entire collection of books before the new library was opened.

The 3,000th book, "Land of Their Choice," is a collection of letters that immigrants wrote to friends and relatives in the lands they had left. It tells a little-known human story that is part of the larger saga of America.

The letters, written by Norwegian immigrants in the middle of the nineteenth century, are representative of a great body of historical material.

The book reflects an image of America that was projected into the minds of Europeans in an era when nations were crossing the seas and moving westward.

The second book to exceed the 3,000 goal is "The First Book of Printing," which gives the history of printing from the invention of movable type to the most modern electronic engravers and phototypesetters.

The books are now available in the library.

Gary Hamlin, class of '55, was home from Fort Knox, Kentucky, April 7, on a three day pass. He will leave for Germany June 17.

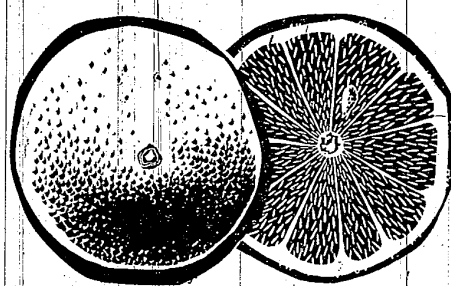
