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Invite Residents To Open House At Pontiac Hospital

Farmington area residents are invited to the tenth annual open house of the Pontiac State Hospital from April 22 through May 2.

All four days of the open house escorted tours of the hospital will be conducted from 1 to 4 p.m. Various aspects of mental illness and modern treatment will also be discussed during these hours. Exhibits of work done by patients in Occupational Therapy will be shown. "Frontier Days" revues will be staged by patients at 3 p.m. under the auspices of the Recreational Therapy Department.

On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings from 9 to 11 a.m. escorted tours of the hospital will be conducted for high school groups. Discussions of Occupational Therapy work done by patients will be shown.

Special films on mental health will also be shown and discussed at both the morning and afternoon programs.

On Wednesday evening only similar programs will be conducted from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. On Monday evening, April 24, a mental health work shop will be conducted from 8 to 10 p.m. Topics to be discussed will be "Problems of the Aged," "Children in Trouble," "Care and Treatment of the Mentally Ill." Admission will be by ticket only for this workshop and may be secured free of charge by calling or writing the Director of the Social Service Department at the Pontiac State Hospital, FE. 5-8146.

A program entitled "Careers in Mental Health Field" primarily for high school groups will be given from 7 to 9 p.m. Monday.
