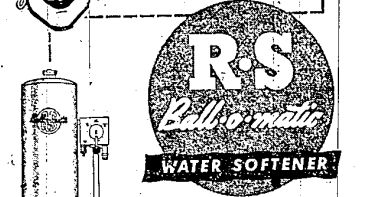

"At most to a man," said Major Mayer, "the returnees lamented their lack of actual information, knowledge about our democratic system. Many of them being relatively young men, had never been made aware of the protections and guarantees this Government affords its people and the fact that these are so advanced over anything in Communist countries."

The Major also mentioned lack of patriotism. "A great many people," he said, "feel that references to patriotism and love of country are somewhat embarrassing, unsophisticated, or foolish."

## FIGURES INDICATE TURN TOWARD TROUT FISHING

A curious shift in purchases of fishing licenses during 1955 has Conservation Department officials wondering if more and more anglers will turn to trout fishing in the next few years.

State officials are comparing the following sets of figures:

In 1954, a total of 1,186,000 resident and non-resident fishing licenses were sold. In 1955, the total slipped to 1,145,000, a decrease of about 34 per cent.

In 1954, the state sold 212,500 trout stamps and last year about 225,000, an increase of about six per cent.

"Past trends would indicate if our sales of fishing licenses slumped, then trout stamp sales would fall off, too," said A. L. McNeil, in charge of Department license sales.

"The drop in licenses and the rise in trout stamps is interesting. We'll watch what happens this year."

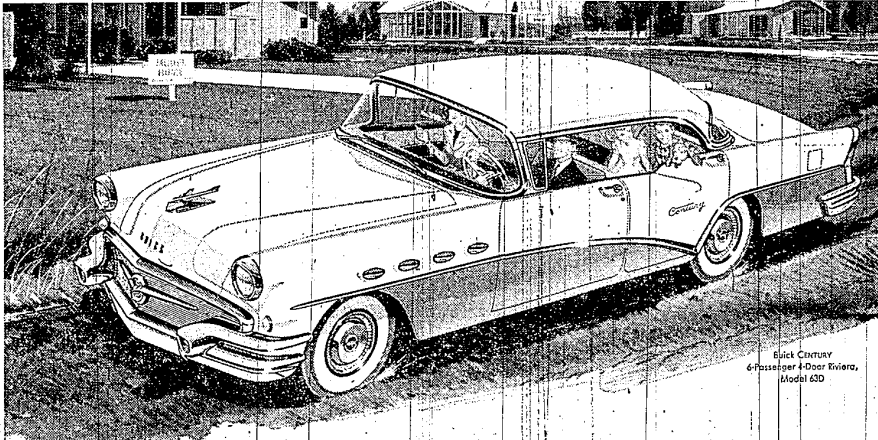
