ADJOURNING DATE, PLACE AND TIME OF PUBLIC HEARING ON DETERMINATION TO PAVE ALTA LOMA DRIVE UNDER PROVISIONS OF ORDINANCE C-26-52 KNOWN AS SPECIAL ASSESSMENT ORDINANCE

That the date, place and time at which the Council of the City of Farmington will meet for the purpose of conducting a public hearing on the advisability of paving Alta Loma Drive in the City of Farmington and on the advisability of establishing a Special Assessment District for such purpose, be and the same is hereby adjourned to Monday, April 23, 1956 at 7:30 p.m. at the City of Farmington, Michigan.

1. Petition re: Sewer in State Street. Petition read and placed on file.

2. Petition re: Paving of Powers Road. Petition read and placed on file.

3. Communication re: Interceptor Sewer. City Manager instructed to check with Financial Consultants and City of Detroit and submit report and recommendation to City Council.

4. Communication from Detroit Edison Co. re: Quit Claim Deed to 12' strip of property along Shiawassee. City Manager instructed to check and report to Council.

5. Communication from Police Department re: Salary Increase. Police Department members to meet with Council at Budget Hearing on April 23, 1956 at 8:00 p.m.

6. Report of City Manager re: Negotiations for pumping station site and easements for Interceptor Sewer. Tabled to permit City Manager to obtain additional information.

Residents Invited To Open House At N'ville Hospital

With National Mental Health Week being observed from April 29 to May 5, Northville State Hospital, located at 41001 West Seven Mile Road, will hold its Fourth Annual Open House program on Sunday, April 29, from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Residents of the Farmington area may have tours of the hospital arranged for them. Members of the staff and patients will act as guides. Wards will be included in the tours and electric shock areas will be visited.

Occupational therapy shops and classes will be in progress for observation. On coming into Northville State Hospital, one would first be amazed at its structure. There are no high walls or fences. Going through well-lighted halls and wards, people will be seen engaged in various recreational activities, working, or busily occupied in one of the hospital's many programs.

Inside the hospital, one would find a wide variety of added cells or any of the other devices usually associated with modern hospitals. There are 20 modern buildings on the 520 acres of landscaped land with several additional buildings to be added.

Northville Hospital officials' philosophy is that the patients are individuals who have dignity, rights and feelings. These people are mentally ill and have come to the hospital for treatment, not confinement. Mental illness can be treated and patients rehabilitated and returned to the community, officials state.

In talking with Dr. Philip N. Brown, medical superintendent, he states, "The Northville State Hospital is being constructed at an opportune time in this period of enlightenment of the public, and is the highest aim of this hospital to aid, abet and teach the policies of sound mental health and to prevent wherever possible the development of mental illness and to rehabilitate as rapidly and effectively as can humanely be done those afflicted."

First Forest Fire Reported Last Week

First weekly forest fire report of the year, happily about three weeks later than usual, was issued early last week at Conservation Department offices in Lansing.

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School Budget Instructional Costs Take Biggest Percentage Of District's Budget

Operating a School District is a big business. Earlier this month, the School Board of the Farmington Public School District approved a tentative operating budget for the 1956-57 school year of \$1,810,790, which has been determined by school officials to be the minimum amount needed to provide adequate education for youngsters of the District.

Of this total, \$1,604,255 has been earmarked for yearly operating expenses and the remaining \$206,535 for the revolving fund to be used for the purchase of equipment and supplies having useful life over a longer period of time.

A major portion of the money needed as specified in the budget will be used for instructional purposes. A total of \$1,204,890 or 75.1 per cent of the budget as set up is earmarked for this use. Teachers' salaries will require 63.6 per cent of the \$1,810,790.

As outlined the budget calls for 11 per cent of the total to be used for operation of the school system's plants and 4.3 per cent for salaries and expenses of administrative personnel.

It has been determined that another 1.1 per cent of the total budget will be needed for school maintenance with 7 per cent set aside for fixed charges. Included in the fixed charges expenses are allocations for insurance, non-reimbursable transportation, health services, recreational services and auxiliary activities.

Contrary to most people's belief, the major portion of these expenses will not be borne by local taxpayers paid directly to the School District. Approximately \$8.8 per cent will come from State, Federal and County Special Education fund appropriations. Local taxes will provide for 37.6 per cent of the total with the remaining 3.8 per cent to come from miscellaneous sources. In the latter category is included money collected from delinquent taxes and any balance which may be on hand from the budget of the previous year.
