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first point of sale) are discouraged from buying, because of a higher price, we pile up surpluses. In 1948, we had a 3.1 million-bale carry-over; in 1950, 6.8 million bales. Today we face the prospect of a record high 14 million-bale carry-over.

"Surpluses compel production control measures. But these measures haven't controlled the supply either here or on the foreign lands (where our controls can't apply.) Besides, acres taken out of a subsidized commodity generally go in to other crops. These 'diverted acres' increase the supply of uncontrolled crops and livestock, and drive down the prices farmers and ranchers can get for uncontrolled products. "Similar results are obtained when government 'price-fixing' is applied on any commodity. They vary only in degree. This explanation, by the nation's largest organization of farmers, is worthy of everyone's attention since the Farm Problem affects us all directly or indirectly.

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Scott W. Cole Announces Candidacy

For District 4 State Representative

Scott W. Cole of Northville recently announced his candidacy for State Representative in the Fourth District of Michigan in the Republican ticket. The Fourth District, created two years ago, includes all of Oakland County and some area to the west.

An instructor at the University of Michigan, Cole was granted permission by the Board of Regents to run for office. Cole graduated from Northville High School in 1937 and was appointed as a page in the Michigan House of Representatives soon afterward. The following session he served as an assistant bill clerk.

Cole attended Hillsdale and Michigan Normal Colleges and the University of Michigan, graduating with AB and MA degrees. He entered the Michigan National Guard in 1941 and was commissioned two years later. During World War II he served with the First Cavalry Division. He was recalled to active duty in 1948 and served with the First Cavalry in the Korean action.

He holds the Purple Heart, the Bronze Star, two presidential citations and the Silver Star. His military career was terminated in Michigan after serving as Intelligence Officer of the Military District of Michigan.

Cole is a member of the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts and Letters; a member of the Novi Board of Commerce, American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and American Veterans of World War II. He is a past-president of the Northville Young Republican Club.

In the past, Cole stated, the representative for this district has always come from the Berkley area, including incumbent Theodore Hughes. The population there is no greater than in the Northville, Farmington, Novi and South Lyon area, but the area is more concentrated and the vote is heavier, he said.

Cole stated, "I feel there is a great need for individual representation in the district due to the great influx of people and rapid progress we are making in becoming a heavily populated area."

Hamlin Named Area GOP Head

TWO FROM AREA ENLISTED IN ARMY RECENTLY

Two Farmington area young men recently enlisted in the United States Army through the Grand Army and Southfield recruiting office. It was disclosed last week.

They have been sent to Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, for their basic training, following which they will return home on leave. Bradley V. Lombard of 21650 Jefferson enlisted for three years in the Infantry. Francis N. Suter of Novi Township enlisted in the Army, "Operation Sheepskin," whereby high school graduates select the technical school of their choice before enlistment. Suter will attend the Telephone Installation and Repair School at Camp Gordon, Georgia.

At the present time, in addition to the high school graduate technical school program, young men may enlist for a short time to join the Tenth Division in Germany after taking basic training in California.

A recruiting sergeant for the Army is in the Municipal Building in Farmington every Monday and Thursday. Interested young men of the area may receive further information from him. Friends may enlist in "Baby Groups" and be together during the early part of their service.

A report from local postmaster Henry Trombley last week disclosed that applications for Civil Service examinations are still being accepted at the Farmington Post Office to qualify persons interested in postal employment.

Trombley also announced that a revised edition of all U. S. postage stamps issued during the period between 1947 and 1955 is now being prepared for the use of stamp collectors. The edition will be available from Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., at a total cost of 75 cents.
