

BOXER JOE LOUIS SLATED TO WRESTLE AT OLYMPIA MAY 24

Joe Louis is coming back as a wrestler to the city where he first gained fame as one of the finest boxers of all time.

The ex-Brown Bomber, still trim and agile at 41, will meet Big Jim Bernard in one of the headline mat bouts in the all-star wrestling show at the Olympia Thursday, May 24.

Louis has been toying for some months with the idea of turning to a wrestling career. He is no stranger to the wrestling circuits. He has refereed regularly at wrestling arenas throughout the country.

He recently made the big move, engaging in his first match as a wrestler. Whether he will decide to devote his full energies to wrestling is uncertain. But his experience against Bernard in Detroit will help him to reach a decision.

Many experts think that Louis could look forward to a successful and profitable wrestling career. His age would be no great handicap. He is 41 - and many of the best wrestlers in the business are older than that.

Louis has experience, but is a natural athlete with unusual coordination and strength. He is accustomed to the harsh give and take which the wrestling ring engenders. He has had a chance to study the sport close up during his years as a wrestling referee. And his tremendous punching power would be a great asset.

His mat rules require him to hit with the heel of his hand.

"Bronko Nagurski and Primo Carnera are two great athletes who turned to wrestling after their other careers ended," says an expert.

"Both Nagurski and Carnera made good on their own in wrestling. Louis certainly can do the same."

PLANT A GARDEN TO CUT YOUR WEIGHT. NUTRITIONIST SAYS

If you're worried about keeping your weight down, plan to plant a home vegetable garden. The Michigan Department of Health says that besides producing fresh vegetables, a garden can help you cut your weight.

"The planning and pulling may be just what you need to trim off excess fat built up over winter months," says a nutritionist.

"But it may not be wise to begin in a frantic pace," cautioned Mrs. Alice Smith, head of the department's nutrition section. "If you haven't had much exercise all winter, the health department has some suggestions."

"A warm-up period - perhaps just turning over a few shovels of ground a day until you get used to it again."

"If you are planting a small garden, and want to get the most value per pound and production per square foot, the health department said these vegetables should be on your priority list: beans, beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, Swiss chard, onions, spinach, peppers and tomatoes."

"A wisely planned home garden," Mrs. Smith said, "is one of the best places to get the vitamins and minerals your family needs for health, vigor and growth. The leafy green and yellow vegetables are rich in Vitamin A. Tomatoes are rich in Vitamin C. Just being out in the sunshine also gives your body a chance to create Vitamin D."

"Even if you have only a small plot of ground," she urged, "take the time to make a garden. Few things you do will give you so much for so little."

SUMMERLIN TO FACE BOB SATTERFIELD AT OLYMPIA MAY 23

Bob Satterfield, the sensational kayo artist from Chicago, will take aim at Johnny Summerlin's heavy-weight title hopes in their set at the Olympia Wednesday, May 23.

Satterfield is the first top-ranking heavyweight contender whom Summerlin has ever met. In the opinion of fight men around the country, he will provide the acid test of Summerlin's fitness to seek the crown recently abdicated by Rocky Marciano. Satterfield has the know-how and the lethal punching power to fully explore Summerlin's defenses.

Although he now ranks No. 5 among the top challengers for the title, Summerlin has never before faced any of the leading contenders. The Detroit scrapper has won legions of fervid admirers in Michigan and in California, where he has done almost all his fighting. Outside of these two states, however, he is virtually unknown.

The duel with Satterfield is especially important since this will be Summerlin's first appearance in a nationally televised bout.

Van Dyke Takes Falcons Nine, 4-3

The Falcons' baseball team lost a heart-breaking 4-3 decision to Beverly in ten innings of play here Monday afternoon. The loss was the first in league play for the team this year.

Falcons scored first for Farmington by cracking a long fly over the right fielder's head and into the creek for a home run. It was the Falcons' first home run of the season.

Don Shuster and Dennis Hamilton also may set records.

The track team isn't going to get all the headlines, however. The baseball team got off to a good start in its first league contest by defeating Southfield.

The team has very good pitching this year with the platoon system at second and first base. Tom Grimshaw and Dave Catherman start the game because of their hitting and speed. In the late innings Steve Phelps and Bud Jones are put in because of their fielding skills.

The Seniors are represented in the outfield only, with Bill Landers, Don Robinson and Jerry Flick on the starting lineup.

Jim Hanson is a very capable catcher and is now beginning to get his batting eye.

The J. V. baseball team is having a good season this year, having won both of its games. George Schulkins was the winning pitcher over Our Lady of Sorrows and Louis McKellan triumphed over Southfield.

Falcons Tracksters Take 2nd In Meet

A strong surge late in the meet earned the Falcons thinclads a second in a triangular meet with Cranbrook and Rochester.

The final score was, Cranbrook 58.9; Farmington, 39.2; and Rochester, 29.4.

After being shut out in the shot but was able only to finish third, meet, the Falcons began picking up points.

It was here the Farmington team began its comeback. Don Nichols narrowly missed breaking the school record of 5' 9 1/2" which he set last year, as he won the high jump. Al LeSage placed third and W. Cawley fourth.

Bill Fulton tied for first in the pole vault, followed by Cawley and O'Connor who tied for third. Brewster placed second in the 220, and came out behind the winner.

Dave Warriner, running the 880 for the second time in his career, placed first after a tense duel with the Cranbrook half-miler.

In the final event of the meet, the Falcon 880 relay team of Oliver, Fulton, Agee and Brewster won the relay in a thriller. After taking a lead in the second leg the team looked as if it would walk away with the relay, but were nearly taken in the final leg by the previously unbeaten Cranbrook team. However, Brewster fought back and the come-from-behind attempt of Cranbrook.

Farmington collected five firsts, two seconds, three thirds and six fourths. Cranbrook had seven firsts, and Rochester had two.

Scorers for Farmington were: Fulton 61, Warriner 5, Shuster 5, Nichols 5, Brewster 41, Kosty 4, LeSage 21, Agee 21, and Wewey Nichols 1.

Farmington's next meet is the Regionals at Howell, Saturday, May 12.

SEA LAMPREYS TURN ATTACK ON RAINBOW TROUT

Sea lampreys, the predators that have wiped out lake trout in most of the Great Lakes, apparently have turned their attacks toward rainbow trout populations.

Fish division workers who have transferred 117 rainbows over Pippy Dam on the Manistee River say that about 90 per cent of the fish bore lamprey scars.

Rainbow trout populations in the river also have fallen off during recent years. Last year, 255 were transferred over the dam for spawning upstream and that figure may not be reached this season.

The decrease in rainbows was evident as early as 1954 when only 192 fish were listed over the dam.

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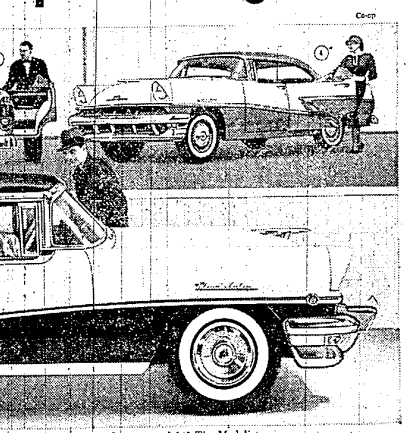
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
