On Sunday, May 20, the Grace Lutheran Church, Grand River at Imperial Highway, will hold Confirmation services for 57 children who will be received into membership.

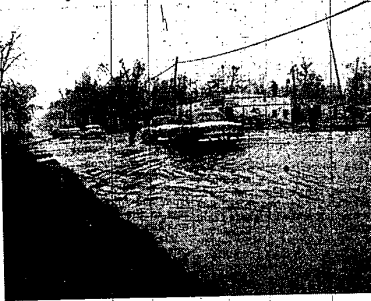

Farmington Units To Participate In Scouting Exposition May 17, 18, 19

Plans have been completed for the largest Scouting show ever to be presented by the Detroit Area Council, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, May 17, 18 and 19, at the Michigan State Fairgrounds.

More than 25,000 boys representing every municipality in the metropolitan area, including several Farmington area units, will participate in the Exposition, which includes over 500 indoor booth exhibits and spectacular pageants in the Coliseum each of the three evenings and one afternoon. Show time hours are 7 to 10 p.m. Thursday and Friday and 2 and 10 p.m. Saturday.

In addition to the indoor exhibits and pageants, a large outdoor area will accommodate special demonstrations of camping, pioneering, sports, aquatics and specialties - such as barbecuing a steer, preparing flap-jack batter in a concrete mixer, demonstrating an electronic cooking range, and a sturdy 60 foot monkey bridge.

Authentic displays and demonstrations in Indian lore, wood craft, first aid, conservation, aviation, photography, art, gardening, dramatics, music, and even home repairs, will be among the hundreds of fascinating Scouting crafts and skills featured. The Exposition will cover the advancement program in Scout Troops and Explorer Units including over 100 Merit Badge subjects. Cubs, also have their achievement program of home centered skills, hobbies, and crafts, all of which will be portrayed. Of particular interest to young folks will be several assortments of pets on display, also riding horses and pack burros from the D-Bar-A Ranch, Scouting's 1,400 acre Western style camp near Metamora. The Council's other major camp, the Charles Howell Reservation, near Brighton, will feature its famous conservation and summer aquatic programs.

The Exposition is being presented to give members of the local Council (more than 74,000 registered boys and leaders) opportunity to show their families and friends and other people of this Metropolitan area the many skills which Scouting offers.

General theme of this year's Exposition is "Onward for God and My Country," a four year program launched during Scout Week last February. The philosophy of the "Onward for God and My Country" program is designed to give youth of today opportunities to develop physical fitness, self-reliance and obligation to God.
