been earmarked for transportation of non-reimbursable public school students.


A report was made to the Board by Superintendent O. E. Dunkel on plans by the County Board of Education to expand special education facilities in the School District. Proposed is the addition of a visiting teacher, a speech correctionist, and two additional rooms and teachers for mentally retarded children. Dunkel was instructed by the Board to proceed in working out details on the proposed expansion.

Following a considerable discussion, the Board approved a recommendation by President Brown that literary productions presented in school buildings in the future be reviewed and approved by the administrative staff prior to being presented. Brown stated that he felt the action was necessary to prevent any future presentation of plays like the Farmington Players' production "Strange Bedfellows" now being staged at the Junior High School gymnasium. While the play has been advertised as "adult entertainment," Brown stated that it was not fitting for presentation in a school building.

Other action by the Board included authorization for the purchase of nine new school buses and acceptance of a driver-training auto from Blacklock Buick. Landscaping and seeding as proposed earlier at the three new elementary school sites was authorized and acceptance of school officials' recommendations for textbooks to be used in classes next year was given.

Bids from four construction firms for work to be done on the football field and running track at the new athletic field site were received and placed on file.

ments but that they are subject to final decision by the Township Board. Judge Moore also stated that, according to statute, the people can petition for a referendum vote regardless of whether the Board accepts or rejects the proposal. In order to place the question on the ballot, petitions bearing the signatures of at least 10% of the registered voters who are resident property owners of the Township, must be filed with the Township Clerk within 30 days of the passing of the amendment.

Immediately following the presentation of the legal opinions by Judge Moore, the question was thrown open for discussion. Eagle stated that the Board wants to do what is right for the Township and asked that there be no demonstrations from the floor. The pros and cons of the proposal were discussed in detail by those present at the meeting. In addition, a number of questions were asked of both Judge Moore and the Board regarding the procedures of enactment and various phases of the proposal.

At the conclusion of the vote by the Board, several persons asked when petitions would be available for circulation and how many signatures would be required to place the question on the ballot. Floyd Cairns, Township Clerk, stated that there are 6,245 registered voters in the Township. Judge Moore stated that he would accept the petitions if the Board so desired. He stated that he could have the petition forms available in two days. The Board authorized him to proceed.

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Teenage Dance Planned May 26






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
