


High School Library Club Visits Units In Detroit

French II Class Writings Cover France's History

The French II class taught by Miss Bastianelli recently turned in term papers covering the entire history of France.

Each student chose a certain period in French history and made a detailed report of his era. When each of the eleven students' papers was turned in, Miss Bastianelli had before her the story of France from the time the Gauls ruled to modern France.

The Prehistoric era to 313 A. D. done by Nancy Beal, includes the conquest of Gaul (France) by Julius Caesar in 58 B. C. and the founding of Paris in 48 B. C.

Gretchen Renz took the Dark Ages up to 987 A. D. when Hugh Capet established a new dynasty. The era also included the reign of the great Charlemagne.

From 987 A. D. to the death of Joan of Arc in 1429 was covered by Julia Ellingham. The crusades highlighted this era.

Dan Burnett and Shirley Porter wrote about the Renaissance, Dan covered art, architecture and music, and Shirley did other parts.

The Absolute Monarchy (1598-1789) was divided between Linda Clarke and Ted DeGroot. This era includes the life of Louis XIV at the great palace of Versailles.

Chris Ableton wrote about the Revolution (1789) including the Reign of Terror and the corrupt government.

In 1789, the government was overthrown and Napoleon became consul, later to be ruler of France. Judy Wisinger took this period until 1815 in French history.

Claudia Costello covered the Restoration (1824) and the Second Empire (1851-1870), up until the time of the Third Republic in 1870.

Finally Mary Giffin took contemporary France, World Wars I and II and the Fourth Republic.
