Spring Band Concert Planned At Clarenceville H. S. May 24

The Clarenceville High School Band will present its annual Spring Concert at 8 p.m. Thursday, May 24, at the high school. The evening promises to be an entertaining one because of the many features of the program. Before the Senior Band takes the stage, a large combined Elementary - Junior High Band will play four short selections. This large group will consist mostly of fifth, sixth and seventh grades, but they will be assisted by a few eighth and ninth graders from the Junior Band.

The main portion of the concert will be played by the Senior High School Band. Some of the band selections will be the first movement of Schubert's "Unfinished Symphony," "March," Leroy Anderson's "Syncopated Clock," and excerpts from "Carousel." Roger Rapelle, senior student and first trombone, will play a movement from a Mozart concerto for trombone with piano accompaniment. The drummers will be featured in "Percussion Antics." A novelty for narrator and band, "Little Boy Riding Hood," will be included.

There will be no admission charge for the concert, but a free-will collection will be taken for the band fund.

Under the direction of Ervin Nichols, the band has had quite an active year. Beginning in September, they marched at all the home football games and some of the away games. A Christmas Concert was presented. On May 30, the band will lead the Memorial Day Parade in the Clarenceville area.

Small groups from the band have been sent to small pep band played at most of the home basketball games. The 12-piece dance band played at two of the high school dances.

C.H.S. Girls Attend G.A.A. Conference

Miss Betty Myers, sponsor, Janet VanArman and Catherine Barnes attended the Clear Lake Camp Conference, sponsored by the N. S. H. W. S. Leadership Conference. The conference held May 18, 19, and 20. Forty-five schools were represented by the 125 girls present.

Goals of leadership, citizenship, and learning athletic skills were highlighted. These same goals are the objects of most of the girls' athletic associations in this area.

Discussed at the conference were: methods of stimulating interest in a variety of activities including athletics, and intramural and interschool leagues for girls' participation in athletics.

At the close of the conference a state G. A. A. board for a standardization of rules and regulations was set up. A regular convention was decided upon and a league board for the planning of league activities was initiated.

TEACHER WINS SCHOLARSHIP TO PAINT COURSE

Darwin Larson, physics and chemistry instructor at Clarenceville High School, has been awarded a scholarship by the Federation of Paint and Varnish Production Club of the Detroit Area.

Mr. Larson will attend a seven-day paint short course at North Dakota State College, Fargo, North Dakota. Selection was made from this region composed of southeastern Michigan and portions of adjacent states.

The Federation is sponsoring the short course designed specifically for school teachers to give them a brief insight into the paint industry. The teachers then are encouraged to transmit this new knowledge to chemistry students so that they will consider chemistry of protective coatings as a career.

Mr. Larson will leave immediately after the close of school to attend the session, which begins Monday, June 18.
