She stated that the five classes are now using the Beacon Press materials, aimed to help the child understand the natural unfolding of life, and his place in it.

Mr. Schlotterbeck reported that the services of a full time minister have been secured for the first time since 1924, with the exception of the two years during which Dr. Frank D. Adams served the church on a semi-retired plan. He also stated that plans are under way for the annual finance canvass for funds for the coming year.

A. have at least one program throughout the year on legislation to acquaint parents with facts concerning laws to be voted on at elections.

Recommendations of the executive board which will be voted on at the first regular council meeting next fall were to amend the council's by-laws to include the president of each local unit in membership on the executive board and to change the regular meeting dates of the council to every other month and the meeting date of the executive board to each month preceding a regular meeting of the council. This will help local presidents by requiring them to attend only one meeting a month instead of two.
