Russ Desmelik Wins Scholarship

Russell Desmelik of 23661 Wilmet Street was listed among a group of 546 graduating seniors from Michigan high schools announced as winners of Regents Alumni Scholarships at the University of Michigan last week.

The scholarships carry a stipend equivalent to semester fees for the freshman year and are renewable for the normal length of the degree program in which the student enrolls provided the student's academic record justifies renewal. The award winners were selected from 1351 applicants representing 319 high schools.

The awards are made by the Community on University Scholarships with the assistance and advice of University alumni and alumnae and high school principals and teachers in the communities in which the applicants reside. In evaluating the applications, the committee places special emphasis upon character, citizenship, the high school academic record, financial need, and the scores made on the competitive test written by all applicants.

Christian Science Group To Lease Franklin Church

Arrangements have been completed for the new Christian Science Society of Franklin to use the present building of the Franklin Community Church when that latter moves to its new church now under construction behind the Village Green. The move is expected in June.

Since its organization on April 17 of last year, the Christian Science group has met at the Franklin Community Hall.

The Franklin Community Church is one of the oldest in the area, having been organized in 1840 and having worshipped continuously at its present German Hill location since the original building was erected in 1861. The steadily increasing size of its membership and its inability to acquire sufficient additional land to expand the historic building have forced it to move to the new location.

Edward J. Green, chairman of its board of trustees, said that the board was particularly happy about the arrangement made with the Christian Science group because it will continue the 85 years of unbroken use of the building for religious worship.

The arrangements announced by the two groups provide for a one-year renewable lease with an option to purchase at any time during the period.

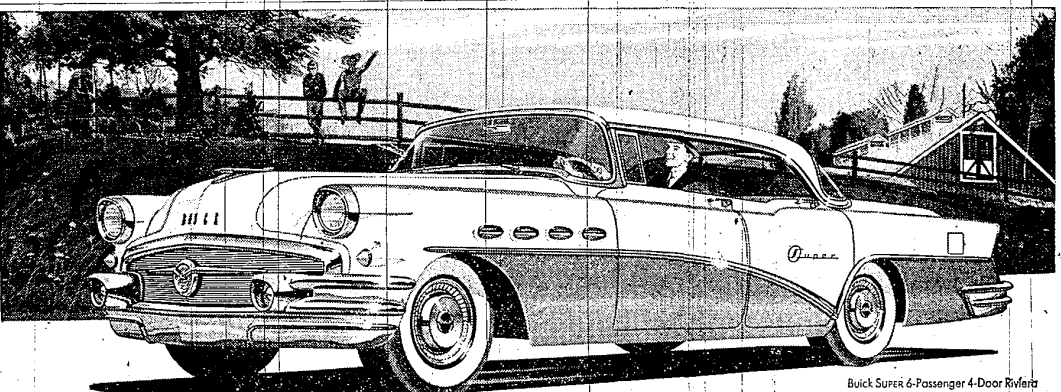
