

Search Is On To Find Queen Of '73 Festival

FARMINGTON Cash and scholarship awards totaling at least \$350 await the young lady crowned queen of the 1973 Farmington Founders Festival.

The festival committee is now accepting entries for the Queen's Pageant and has disclosed that an article number of sponsors stand ready to provide backing.

Applications are available at Sunflower Nutritional Foods, 24359 Halstead; Chamber of Commerce headquarters at Grand River and Farmington Rd., or by calling Mrs. Elinor Morandy, pageant chairman.

Each contestant must be a resident of the City of Farmington or Farmington Hills since Jan. 1, never have been married, and between the ages of 17 and 22 inclusive.

"The Chamber of Commerce will provide a sponsor if you do not have one," says the official entry form.

Dates of the annual fête are July 26, 27 and 28 and Mrs. Morandy has announced that the crowning of the queen will take place at 7:30 p.m. on opening night in the Downtown Shopping Center.

Final judging will be conducted at 4:30 that same afternoon in the Bessford Inn following preliminary judging on Tuesday, July 24.

So far the prize list includes \$100 in cash, \$100 scholarship to the senior of the queen's choice and a \$350 scholarship to the Abelle Modeling School of Dearborn, as well as a trophy and many gifts from merchants.
