Urges Prompt Mail Box Improvement

Although "Mail Box Improvement Week" May 21 through 27, is now over, it is still not too late to make necessary improvements on and around a rural box, postal officials pointed out last week.

Postal forms with check marks giving the irregularities where an improvement could be made in mail receptacles or boxes were distributed last week. Many have already made the improvements.

Postmaster Trombley stated, "Those who have not yet done so, he urged that they take necessary steps to have the suggested improvements taken care of immediately. If suggested improvements are not taken care of, Trombley stated, second notices will be sent out to the patrons concerned in the near future."

Errors in postal deliveries are sometimes caused, Trombley said, when the patron's name and house number are not on the mail box. This is especially true, he said, when the route is being served by a substitute carrier.

When neither a house number or a name appears on the mail box, it is often impossible for the mail to be delivered, especially by a substitute carrier, Trombley concluded.
