School Board

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Board requested the administrative staff to prepare a complete report on the incident and on the injury insurances provided for students in all physical education classes.
Other action by the Board included authorization for an exchange student to attend classes at Farmington High School again next year and the appointment of an election board. The Board appointed eight regular members, an alternate, and four part time members for the forthcoming School Election.
Approval was also granted to a request by the City for use of the Junior and Senior High Schools as polling places in this year's elections.
A request for use of the Junior High School gym free of charge for the presentation of an opera by Our Lady of Sorrows School students was tabled. It was decided to review the general policy regarding use of school facilities without charge by outside groups. Action relative to issuing continued contracts to teachers was also held over following discussion.
A letter from the Superintendent of Public Instruction regarding that office's stand on transportation of non-public school students on public school buses was read at the request of James Randolph. It was agreed by the Board that this letter be made public as requested by Randolph. The complete text of the letter will be published in next week's issue of The Enterprise.
At the close of the meeting, Superintendent Dunkel reported that the value of the School District had been placed at \$49,942,400 by the County Equalization Board Monday afternoon. This, he indicated, was substantially higher than the estimates used to determine that office's school taxes in the District for this year. He promised a complete report as soon as final action is taken by the County Tax Allocation Board.

ing the water district proposal. In answer to the question, "Do you have a satisfactory well?" 377 stated yes and 348 no, while at the same time the second question, "Do you want to be a part of the proposed Water District?" drew 584 yes answers to 300 no.
Cairns stated that the petitions as well as the questionnaires will be turned over to Judge Arthur E. Moore, attorney for the Citizens Water Committee, for study and review. Judge Moore is expected to use the material as a basis of discussion with financial consultants and bonding attorneys. Several conferences have already been held in an effort to determine the most efficient method of financing the proposed project, which would bring water to the "dry areas" from the Detroit system.

C.H.S. Class Of '36 Plans Reunion

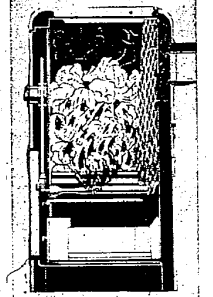

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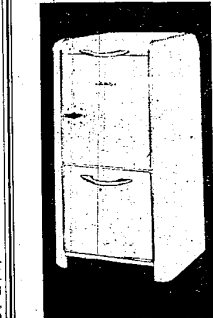
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
