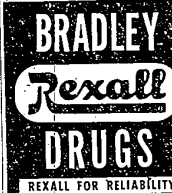

The Wheelers opened their cottage at Strawberry Lake on Memorial Day. Guests for the day were the Leo Sivs of Staman Court.

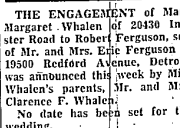
