Residents who have either magazines or papers to be picked up are asked to call Richard Schukins, GR. 4-0309, or Bud Sims, GR. 4-4792.

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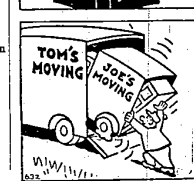
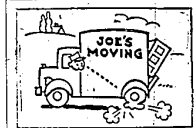
## F.H.S. Class Of '36 Planning Reunion

## Riverside Chapel Minister Returns From Assembly

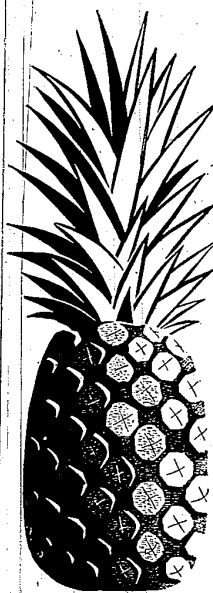

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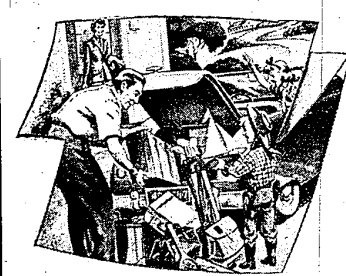


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## Local Library Report Reveals Rapid Growth

The Farmington City and Township library has had an interesting and healthy growth during this past year, officials pointed out in a report this week.

During the past 12 months the librarians have circulated 27,708 books or over 2,300 books per month. As the library is open 44 hours per week for book circulation, this means that over 33 books per hour have been going out on an average.

The circulation in relation to city and township during 1957-58: 1954-55; and the four months of 1958 runs: city, 41 plus per cent and township, 59 plus per cent of the books circulated. The circulation has increased 44 per cent since December 31, 1955. Registrations have also taken an upward trend of 1045 new readers during the past ten months. The extra circulation, registrations, book orders and book processing have made it necessary to keep the library open four extra hours per week.

At present the library budget is \$6,000 per year. When the three-tenths of a mill tax has been voted and received, the library will be eligible for state aid which varies, depending on the amount the state makes available to libraries.

Morning library hours have been provided to enable people to combine shopping tours with library visits with their children.

The proposal of a bookmobile has been considered for some time. It was seriously considered to invite the state bookmobile project to work in the community, but it was not deemed possible because of working space to process the books, working personnel to man the project, or enough money to pay for the service at the present time. It is hoped that a bookmobile may be a part of the project of the new library district board after the new facilities can be arranged to provide the necessary service.
