**Future Problems Of Community To Be Analyzed**

A meeting for all residents of the area, sponsored by the Farmington Township Civic Association, will be held at 8 p.m. Monday, June 11, at the West Bloomfield Township Hall on Orchard Lake Road.

The new civic association, formerly the North Farmington Civic Association, will present a glimpse into the future of the community. The glimpse, association officials pointed out, will be more than just a guess as it will be in the form of an authoritative forecast as prepared by a group of engineers whose business it is to make surveys of this type. None of the material to be presented has been published or made public, officials added.

The first part of the meeting will deal with the planning survey and the problems that will arise from the future spectacular growth of the community. The second part of the meeting will deal with the functions of a township government and on how a township operates within legal limitations. The third part will consist of a review of the association's accomplishments since its founding. Plans will also be presented on expanding the group and taking in other organizations, large and small, to form a larger civic association.
