Local Minister Named Regional Missionary Head

Dr. Gordon D. Northrop, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Farmington, recently had the honor of being elected as regional representative of the Conservative Baptist Foreign Mission Society.

The election took place at the annual session of the National Conservative Baptist Convention in New York City May 23 through May 28.

The Foreign Mission Society, with a history dating back only 13 years, has close to 400 missionaries in 13 different foreign fields with a budget of close to two million dollars.

The national constituency of Conservative Baptists is divided into three regional groupings, Eastern, Central and Western. Chosen by the Central group, Dr. Northrop will represent the area between the western borders of New York and Pennsylvania through the Eastern borders of Colorado and north. Specific duties will deal with missions policies and programs in the Belgian Congo, French West Africa, Ivory Coast in Africa, Brazil, Argentina, and in Palestine.

Dr. H. H. Savage, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Pontiac, was elected chairman of the society. Dr. Northrop's election is for a three-year period, following the recently expired term of Dr. William Colman, pastor of the Highland Park Baptist Church, deceased, and Dr. Franklin Wylie, pastor of the Gratiot Avenue Baptist Church, prior to that.

Dr. Elmer Palmer, former pastor of the church here now pastoring in Chicago, has also served as regional representative on the same board in past years.

LT. R. Scheiber Completes Course

Second Lieutenant Richard E. Scheiber, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul R. Scheiber of 34024 Oakland Avenue, Farmington, completed the Signal Corps Officers Basic Course at the Signal School at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, on June 6, the Army disclosed this week. He was sent to the Signal School to receive basic training in the duties and responsibilities of Company Grade Officers prior to joining a field unit.

The 23 year old officer graduated from the University of Michigan in January, 1955. He is a member of Tau Kappa Epsilon and Alpha Chi Sigma fraternities.

The first three weeks of the ten week course was devoted to field training, during which officers participated in such sub-courses as battle indoctrination, bayonet training, hand-to-hand combat, methods of instruction, military leadership and physical conditioning.

Upon completing this part of the course, officers were given thorough training in technical subjects. The seven-week phase consisted of instruction necessary to prepare graduates to assume duties of radio officer, telephone and telephone officer, message center officer or signal supply officer.

The final phase of technical instruction took place in the field. Students had an opportunity to install communication systems and operate them under simulated combat conditions.
