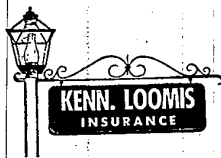

The Farmington School Board met for its regular meeting on Tuesday, June 12, at 7:30 p.m. in the school building. The meeting was presided over by Chairman J. W. Brown. The first item of business was the report of the Superintendent, O. E. Dunkel, relative to the recently-completed school census. Of the 5,666 homes canvassed, he stated that 3,425 children under five years old were counted, and 6,082 were listed in the five to 19 year age group. This is a total increase of 1,866 children in the School District over last year, he added. Heaviest increases were indicated in the Bond and Eagle School areas.

James Randolph, a private citizen at the meeting, questioned whether or not State primary school money was being spent for all school age students. Superintendent Dunkel stated that it was, regardless of whether or not students attended the public schools.

Henry Dehneke, another resident at the meeting, expressed the opinion that the way in which school money was being spent was not generally known. He was advised that the school treasurer's report is published annually and that detailed information about the school budget is available to the public at the school administrative offices.

Mayfair Cooperative Nursery Plans Enlarging Operations For Next Fall

The Mayfair Cooperative Nursery decided this week to accept membership in the group will be accepted throughout the summer for an expanded and improved nursery school program to begin in the fall.

A member of the Wayne - Oakland Council of Cooperative Nursery Groups, the Mayfair group's purpose, according to officials, is to operate a nursery for pre-school children in an environment which will give them freedom to satisfy their basic physical, emotional and social growth needs. The nursery is non-profit and non-sectarian, operating under a license issued by the Children's Bureau of the State of Michigan's Social Welfare Department.

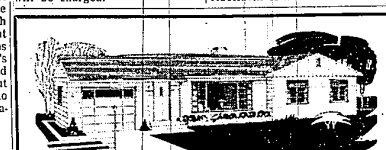
Membership in the nursery group is open to any family wishing to enroll a three- to five-year old child which is willing to assume the duties and responsibilities required of a member. A registration fee and a moderate monthly fee is charged. All mothers of children enrolled are required to attend monthly meetings of all mothers and to assist the teacher once every two weeks at a school session. The "mothers' participation" time is required to make the nursery school a sharing experience for both the mother and the child.

Children enrolled in the school are taught to play together with supervision, yet with freedom of activity, thus building good habits.

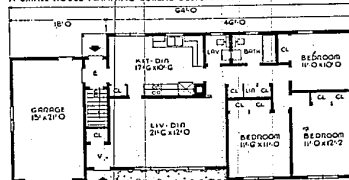

DESIGN C-405. Exterior design calls for low pitch roof, wide eave overhang, covered front and rear porches, brick planter, wide sliding and asphalt shingles. The floor plan comprises living room, kitchen-dinette, three bedrooms, full bath, adjoining laundry and attached garage. There is full basement except under garage.

Storage space consists of coat closet in vestibule and linen closet, wardrobe closets, with storage above. In the bedroom, linen and broom-closet closets in the bedroom hall. A large kitchen, with cabinets on three walls, leaves ample dining space in rear end. Floor area is 1212 square feet with eave of 22,434 cubic feet, not including garage.

the list of the four parent chaperones, along with at least two alternates, be presented to the high school principal at least one week prior to the scheduled time of the dance. Further, in the event the scheduled chaperones are unable to attend the dance, substitutes will be permitted up to 7:30 p.m. of the night of the dance.

A third resolution was approved to the effect that the recommendations of the Mothers' Club Council be made a part of the minutes and that the suggestions be used in future motions relative to student dancing. The suggestions include preparing and distributing a list of dates for each club to choose from, insertion of a notice in the school bulletin requiring all parents who wish to chaperone dances to call the secretary of the Mothers' Club Council and give their name, address, telephone number and which class they will chaperone for. It was also suggested that a meeting be held for all parents who wish to be chaperones along with all members of the Mothers' Clubs and all teachers who will be class sponsors at these dances. The purpose of the meeting would be to establish methods for the controlling of any dance.

\$450,000 bond issue over a 30-year period will be \$263,387.65.

Earl Scherffus, City Manager, stated at the meeting Monday evening that based on bids already received as well as engineer's estimates, the interceptor project will cost approximately \$386,473. These figures cover the facilities which will utilize the full capacity of 6 cubic feet per second as stipulated by Detroit water officials. This capacity would take care of an ultimate city population of 18,000 persons. Construction of a self-contained sewage disposal plant would run approximately \$372,000. However, the costs of operating such a plant would be approximately \$10,000 more per year than the service and maintenance expense of the interceptor.
