**HEART BOOKLET POINTS OUT RECENT ADVANCES IN CURES**

A recent publication released by the Michigan Heart Association, entitled "Hearts in the Balance," presents an accounting of gains made in combating heart and blood vessel diseases. It notes that support of scientific research continued as the Heart Association's biggest "investment" in 1955, with close to \$3,800,000.00 (55.2% of the total budget) allocated for this purpose by the national office, local and state affiliates.

The Michigan Heart Association appropriated more than \$94,000 or 47.1% of its total budget for cardiovascular research. Sizeable sums were also invested in community service and education programs designed "to lessen the impact of cardiovascular disease on those who must live with its consequences."

The report lists a number of forms of heart disease which can be prevented or cured, such as heart disease due to syphilis, diphtheria and some other infections. In addition, the course of malignant hypertension, the most serious form of high blood pressure, can now be reversed in many cases, according to the report. Credited with saving or prolonging life in thousands of cases are a wide variety of new drugs, improved techniques and new and ever more daring heart operations. Rheumatic fever, the most important cause of cardiac disease in children and young people, can also now be prevented in many cases, the report points out.

"Double value" from milk can be had by adding four tablespoons of dry milk to one cup of fluid milk. To mix the two forms of milk, put the dry milk on top of the fluid milk. Then beat with a rotary egg beater, shake in a tightly closed jar or shaker, or use an electric mixer.

**RE-APPOINT AREA METHODIST CHURCH MINISTERS FOR YEAR**

At a mass rally Sunday, June 17, at the Adrian College athletic field, to close the Detroit Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, ministers were placed in charge of their various churches for the coming year.

Russell Sursaw was returned to the First Methodist Church of Farmington and Elsie A. Johns was placed in charge of the Clarenceville Methodist Church. Robert Searls was also re-appointed in charge of the neighboring Franklin Church. Bishop Marshall R. Reed, resident bishop of the conference, announced the appointments.

Bishop Reed also delivered the message of the morning, "Michigan Methodism Tomorrow." He commented "the tomorrow of Michigan Methodism will depend upon (the members') conception of the Church. The future of this Church will depend upon maintaining a historic emphasis or fervor as well as form. It began with the experiences of God so real in the life of John Wesley that his heart was warmed." The bishop said, "We are not a liturgical church... our tradition which should be preserved is that religion is an experience in the lives of men and women."

Bishop Reed challenged Michigan Methodists to rely on the Spirit of God rather than size of the Church. He said, "We would be reminded that it is not by statistical might or organizational power but the Spirit of the living God that we shall survive." The bishop urged interdenominational cooperation with all Christian bodies and challenged Methodists to "lift a trumpet to sound the call to advance for Christ and His Church."

City visitor from Minnesota said it pained him to sit through a dance concert, but his wife just called it ballet-schae.

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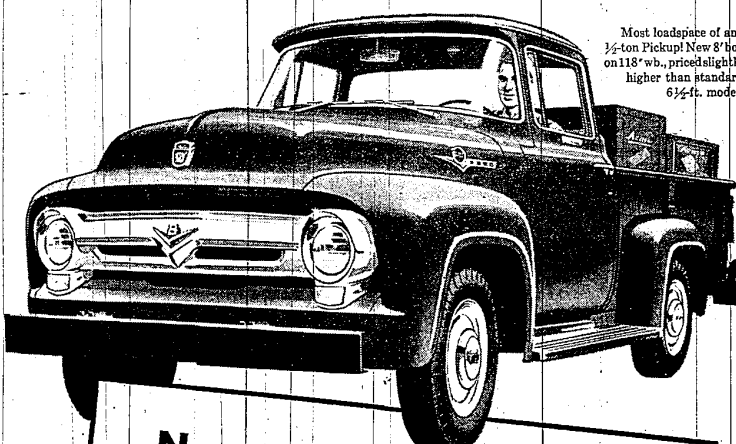
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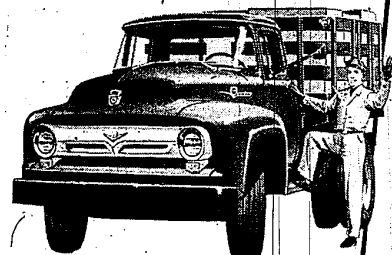
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
