

The juiciest, meatiest, thickest of all barbecue pork is the Boston butt. Buy the whole butt and cut into steaks at least one inch thick for outdoor cooking. Then cook slowly, about eight inches above hot coals, for about 45 minutes. Turn the steaks every five minutes. Seasonings suggested are salt, pepper, a dash of lemon juice or rub with garlic.

Cadmus L. G. Goss of 2631 Abbeyview, Royal Oak, has filed as Republican candidate for the office of Drain Commissioner, it was disclosed last week.

Goss is presently specializing in land planning and the technical aspects of developing acreage in the suburbs of metropolitan Detroit for large-scale residential building. In Oakland County itself his active job files include projects in the Townships of Commerce, Waterford, West Bloomfield, Avon, Novi, Farmington and Royal Oak. Other current projects range from Mt. Clemens to Trenton and include Belleville and Ypsilanti.

The skilled know-how needed for the long-range planning and current engineering of such vital subdivision services as sanitary and storm sewers has been acquired by Goss both from education and working experience.

REPORT 278,000 FISHING LICENSE SALES IN 5 MONTHS

Sales of more than 278,000 resident fishing licenses were reported during the first five months of this year, but the figure was about seven per cent below sales reported in the same period in 1955.

Similar reports on sales of non-resident licenses show a 22 per cent decline over last year.

Unfavorable spring weather probably delayed fishing activities in many areas of the state. Trout stamp sales got off to a slow start, but improved weather has boosted the number of active anglers and trout permits are running close to 1955 sales.

The Conservation Department summary of license totals does not include all sales, but only the sales reported and processed at the Lansing office.

FOOD POISONING CASES INCREASE DURING SUMMER

Too many folks lug "bugs" around in their picnic hamper, and the result, according to state health authorities, is an upswing of food-borne poisoning during summer months.

The "bugs," in this case microscopic bacteria, can grow and develop their poisons whenever hot foods are not kept hot and when cold food is not kept cold, said Dr. F. S. Leeder, director of the department's disease control division.

Dr. Leeder also warned that foods such as creamy salads or custard-filled pastries aren't recommended as picnic fare because they serve as ideal culture media for the obnoxious germs.

One of the common forms of food-borne poisoning, he said, is caused by Staphylococcus germs, which are often found in food and produce their toxin or poison if the food is left standing around at room temperature.

Another food-borne infection is caused by a family of germs known as the "salmonellas" — which are usually spread by persons who are infected with the germs without knowing it. Dr. Leeder said the salmonella germs, which can cause illness ranging from a mild stomach upset to severe dysentery, can be destroyed by cooking food, but the food should be refrigerated promptly to avoid contamination.

The health department spokesman added a caution against storing picnic meals in car trunks or under bus seats. "Because unless the food is in an ice chest, both locations give germs the warmth they need to grow, multiply, manufacture their poisons and spoil the fun of a family outing."

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COUNCIL APPROVES BOOST IN WATER DEBT SERVICE FEE

The City Council has approved a resolution increasing the water department debt service fee from 25% to 75% per quarter effective immediately.

It is estimated that the new percentage will increase the average water bill by approximately \$2.50 per quarter. Officials pointed out that even with the increase, the cost of water service to city consumers is comparable to the average of most municipalities.

The additional fee is being charged to cover the repayment of the \$450,000 Farmington Sewer Interceptor bond issue.
