**NOTICE OF SALE**  
\$2,000.00  
FARMINGTON PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICT, OAKLAND AND WAYNE COUNTIES, MICHIGAN  
Soleid bids for the purchase of School District Bonds to be issued by Farmington Public School District, Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, of the par value of \$2,000.00, will be received by the undersigned, at the office of the Board of Education, 53000 Thomas Street, in Farmington, Michigan, until 3:00 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, on Tuesday, the 10th day of July, 1956, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

Said bonds will be dated June 1, 1956, will be coupon bonds in the denomination of \$1,000 each, will be numbered consecutively in the direct order of their maturity from 1 to 2,000, both inclusive, and will bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding 4% per annum, payable in December 1, 1956, and there after semi-annually on June 1 and December 1. Each bid shall state the annual interest rate or rates upon which it is submitted, expressed in multiples of 1/8 of 1%.

The interest rate for each coupon series on any one bid shall be at one rate only. Accrued interest to date of delivery of such bonds must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

Said bonds shall mature serially on the first day of June in each year as follows: \$50,000 in each of the years 1957 thru 1961, \$20,000 in each of the years 1962 thru 1966, \$70,000 in each of the years 1967 thru 1970, \$80,000 in each of the years 1971 thru 1974, \$90,000 in each of the years 1975 thru 1978, \$100,000 in each of the years 1979 thru 1980, and \$120,000 in each of the years 1981 and 1982. Bonds maturing in the years 1976 thru 1982 are subject to redemption by the school district prior to maturity, in inverse numerical order, on any one or more interest payment dates on and after June 1, 1966, and on accrued interest plus premium on each bond in accordance with the following schedule:

\$5 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1966, but prior to June 1, 1969  
\$20 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1969, but prior to June 1, 1972  
\$15 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1972, but prior to June 1, 1975  
\$10 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1975, but prior to June 1, 1978  
\$5 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1978.

Notice of redemption shall be published in the Enterprise 30 days prior to the date fixed for redemption, at least once in a newspaper of publication circulation in the City of Detroit, Michigan, which carries as a part of its regular service, notice of the sale of municipal bonds. The remaining bonds will not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. Both principal and interest will be payable at such bank or trust company as shall be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds.

The bonds are to be issued for the purpose of defraying the cost of erecting and furnishing a junior high school building and elementary school buildings and acquiring additional school sites in said school district, and will be the general obligations of the school district which is authorized and required by law to levy upon all the taxable property therein such ad valorem taxes as may be necessary to pay said bonds and the interest thereon, without limitation as to rate or amount.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from June 1, 1956 to their respective maturities and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the school district. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds or at a price less than their par value will be considered.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$40,000 drawn on an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the school district, accompanied by each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks and checks of the unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Berry, Stevens & Moorman, Attorneys, Detroit, Michigan, approving the legality of the bonds. The cost of said legal opinion and of the printing of the bonds will be paid by the school district. Bonds will be delivered at Detroit, Michigan.

The right is reserved to reject any or all bids.

Envelopes containing the bids should be plainly marked "Proposal for Bonds".

**MILKY WAY TO HOLD SKY DOMINANCE DURING JULY**  
Fireworks will be the feature attraction in the sky July 4, but during the rest of the month the Milky Way will dominate the heavens, according to University of Michigan astronomer Hazel M. Losh.

This broad, hazy band will come into good view in the early evening hours, she says. "Just after dark it extends as a giant arc from north to south across the eastern sky, rising higher and higher during the later night hours and as the summer progresses."

Photographs taken with modern instruments show that this cloudy appearance is caused by the presence of myriads of stars which cannot be separated by the unaided eye. Field glasses or a small telescope, however, will reveal the innumerable individual stars which form the band, she states.
