Request Raises In Sport Licenses

Price increases recently recommended for Michigan hunting, fishing, camping and trapping licenses could produce about \$1,750,000 in new revenue in 1956, conservation officials disclosed.

As a result of the 1957 legislature, the raises would allow the Conservation Department to continue operation at its present level during 1958. Otherwise, cutbacks in present game, fish, and acquisition, education and protection programs would be inevitable that year, officials stated.

The proposed raises would net about \$2,750,000 in new revenue at present sales levels, more than enough to meet Department needs, officials said. They added, however, that purchasing resistance would cause a 10 per cent decline in total sales the first year, dropping the net revenue from \$10,000,000 to \$9,000,000, about what is needed for the coming fiscal period.

The increases proposed are: resident fishing, from \$1.50 to \$2; temporary non-resident fishing, from \$1 to \$3.50; annual non-resident fishing, from \$1 to \$4.50; trout stamp, from \$1 to \$3; resident small game, from \$2 to \$3; non-resident small game, from \$1.50 to \$2.50; resident deer, from \$3.50 to \$5; non-resident deer, from \$3 to \$4; camp permit, from \$2.50 to \$10; trapping, from \$2 to \$3; resident archery, from \$2 to \$3; and non-resident archery, \$10 to \$25.

CAREFULLY SORT CLOTHES FOR BEST WASHING RESULTS

You may be in a rush to get those soiled clothes into the washing machine, but don't overlook sorting them.

When sorting, place those articles which call for the same kind of washing, the same temperature of water, and have the same amount of soil, reminds Lucile Ketchum, home management specialist at Michigan State University.

If articles are colored, be sure the color is fast before placing them with white or pastel colored clothes. Wash white orlon, nylon and dacron alone since they easily take up color.

Soil may be just plain dirt, like sand and mud, or it may be food, such as milk, eggs, gravy, fruit or vegetables. Miss Ketchum explains that the former calls for hot water, a good detergent and vigorous action. The soil from foods often calls for special treatment before washing.

The longer food stays on clothing, the harder it is to get out. Stains may result which call for special care and also may cause the fabric to deteriorate. Check and remove stains, cautions Miss Ketchum.

SAFETY TIPS SUGGESTED FOR FAMILIES LIVING IN SMALL, COMPACT HOMES

Today's small compact home presents some special problems in housekeeping and family safety. Unless these families plan carefully, they may soon or later find themselves practically ousted by accumulations of furnishings, tools, clothing, furniture and other items.

Such accumulations make for cramped living conditions, which in turn produce hazards not ordinarily found in more spacious abodes. This warning comes from the Institute for Safe Living of the American Mutual Liability Insurance Company as the result of small home accidents.

The principal trouble makers according to the Institute, are improperly stored tools and household goods and too large collections of unused household items. There is a tendency to overstock rooms in a small home with more than necessary furniture and fixtures, resulting in numerous tripping or falling hazards.

The following suggestions are offered for safe small-home housekeeping:

When purchasing a new household item, consider its maximum utility and necessity. Do not purchase furniture or appliances that are too large for the rooms that will accommodate them.

Provide a wall storage board for all hand tools used around the home, particularly those with sharp edges. A similar storage board or cabinet should be provided for kitchen cutlery. Bath shelves be out of reach of children.

Arrange to store lawn and garden tools in the garage or a special corner of the basement. Space will be conserved by hanging long-handled tools on a wallboard built for the purpose. It's safer too!

Provide a wall locker with locks for the storage of all household poisons such as kerosene, ammonia, washing soda, bleaches, cleaning fluids, etc. Note that it will help to conserve space to provide a single cabinet large enough for including poisonous insecticides and garden sprays. It may look

Fireworks Common On Fourth Of July A Century Ago

The Grand Old Fourth of July blazed as gloriously for teenagers a century ago as it does now, according to an old diary in the possession of The University of Michigan Historical Collections.

Elizabeth Gurney (Taylor), fourteen at the time, wrote an account of that holiday as it was celebrated in 1854 in the little town of Centerville in St. Joseph County.

"Today the great Fourth of July has come once more with its pleasures and pains," she writes. "Father and I went to see them form a procession and march to the new Methodist meeting house. Mr. Upson delivered an oration. We went from there to the courthouse after some ice cream and refreshments."

Lizzie didn't have to wait too long for the excitement to start: "While there we were alarmed by the bell ringing and a cry of 'Fire.' We found out it was Mr. Powers' house. They finally succeeded in putting out the fire after tearing up the furniture. Her husband has gone off peddling lightning rods."

She continues, "In the evening we went to see the fireworks in the public square. They had fire balls, roman candles and rockets, some of them beautiful. After the first I went to the courthouse with the market basket after our dishes. They were as busy as ever."

"Again we heard the fire alarm! It was Bennett's tin shop. It caught fire from a fire cracker thrown on the roof. Mr. Powers' house is supposed to have taken fire by a fire cracker on the door mat."

"We found out also that there had been fire enough to burn a large hole in the courthouse stairs, making, in all, three fires in one day. I think that is doing pretty well for good old Centerville!" she concludes happily.

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
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Measuring 30 miles on a scale, the Grand County is an almost perfect square containing 88 square miles the Oakland County Planning Commission points out.
