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RED CROSS PLANS FOR MASS FEEDING IF DISASTER HITS

The mass feeding committee for Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, is now mobilizing for action in time of natural disaster, officials stated.

At a recent meeting Sidney J. Winstunley of Pontiac was appointed chapter chairman of mass feeding, a new chairmanship created due to increased tornado activity and the need for civilian defense preparation.

Others attending the meeting were Mildred E. Bennett, chapter executive director, Stanley Furtin of Pontiac Motor Division, Mrs. John Warren, welfare officer for civil defense in Oakland County; Mrs. J. R. Waggener, South Oakland County Canteen chairman; Fred Dice and William Tyler of Fisher Body Division; Charles Johnson of General Motors Truck and Coach Div., and Claude Elmore, assistant superintendent of the County Board of Education.

The committee discussed the effectiveness of feeding operations during the recent Flint tornado. The techniques and problems were applied to the problem in Oakland County. 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
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
