The opening performance will be shared in with a ceremony complete with motion picture stars and personalities, giant searchlights, bands of music and all the Hollywood trimmings.

"This Is Cinerama" was a picture about places and "Cinera Holiday" a presentation about people, the third production will take the audience on a visit to seldom seen, far-away places with Lowell Thomas, the celebrated newscaster leading the way, as they explore the wonders of the old and modern worlds.

As produced for the Stanley Warner Cinerama Corporation, Lowell Thomas, whose approach to film entertainment has proved almost as revolutionary as Cinera itself, "Seven Wonders of the World" uses real people, real places and real situations to achieve its dramatic effect.

In the three and a half years that have passed since Cinerama was first introduced to the American public, the technique has undergone many modifications and improvements which will be introduced in "Seven Wonders of the World."

Among these are faster lenses, which permit greater flexibility in making interior sequences, a perfected Cinerama Sound system that extends still further the phenomenal range and fidelity of the audio effects, and even closer synchronization of the three separate films that together provide Cinera's single giant image on the screen.

The sense of audience participation that has made Cinera unique as a medium of entertainment, is accordingly intensified still further in the new production.

MORE VOLUNTEER RED CROSS HELPERS, STRONGER PROGRAM URGED IN COUNTY

Most of Oakland County's residents have been fortunate in escaping the destruction and suffering left by tornado disaster, but not one has escaped the keenest of the frequent alerts.

Mrs. Wilbur O. Mitchell, chairman of volunteers for the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, in a recent message to all chapter volunteers expressed the need for an increasingly competent program when she said, "Red Cross has been successful in meeting its responsibilities because of people's willingness to contribute funds and personal services."

"Because of the large scale of Red Cross activities, the National Board of Governors has determined that a more energetic and more systematic effort will have to be made to encourage and make this willingness to serve more effective."

"The Board of Governors of the national organization, in cooperation with the Oakland County Chapter urges all Pontiac and Oakland County residents to search their daily schedules for possible volunteer time in listing its objectives in bettering the volunteer program."

All chapter volunteer officials are working toward an increased number of volunteers better utilization of abilities of volunteers with greater flexibility in assignments, better understanding of Red Cross and the part of all volunteers and more effective recognition of all volunteers' efforts.

One of the most critical, and sometimes most controversial of chapter activities is the blood program. Mrs. Mitchell, in an effort to get across the idea of the importance of the volunteer program has chosen to explain some of the aspects of the blood program to promote better understanding.

Mrs. Mitchell says, "Red Cross does not own the blood program."

Sight Restored By New Operation

As the result of a newly-perfected delicate eye operation done away with cataracts, George E. Reynolds of 22785 Violet Street in Farmington is regaining his vision. It was disclosed this week.

Suffering from failing sight, Reynolds became totally blind two years ago and his doctor indicated at that time that he would never regain his sight. During a visit to Dr. R. C. Smith on Grand River Avenue in Farmington, the Reynolds mentioned that they had heard of the newly-perfected operation which might make it possible for Mr. Reynolds to see again.

Through the efforts of Dr. Smith, arrangements were made with Dr. Winston Davies, Detroit eye specialist, to perform the operation.

It was revealed this week that Reynolds can now see out of one eye and that, following further treatment, will have vision restored to his other eye also. The operation was recently demonstrated on television and is believed to be able to restore vision to numerous persons whom it was previously thought, would remain blind for the rest of their lives.

Garnishes add eye and taste appeal. Bacon bits, croutons, grated cheese, minced chives and parsley are all good ideas.

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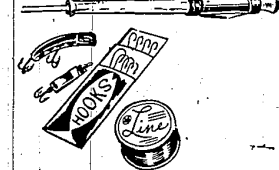
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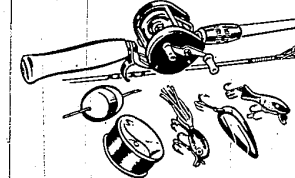


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
