Illegal To Train Dogs In Open Fields Now

Dog owners must wait until after July 15 to train dogs in open fields. State law prohibits breaking, training, or practicing dogs in open fields from April 15 to July 15.

Some birds and animals are nesting during that period and should not be molested. A Berkeley resident who broke this law was ordered to pay a \$17 fine and \$8 court costs in a Holly court.

He was among 61 persons listed on the latest conservation-law convictions report. Financial penalties for the group included \$730 in fines and \$823 in court costs.

All fines assessed for conservation law violations go to the state library fund.

THAWED FOODS CAN BE REFROZEN, AUTHORITY SAYS

Keep frozen foods frozen until you are ready to thaw them for use. But, if frozen foods thawed before needed, they may be safely refrozen under certain conditions.

M.S.U. home economists explain that the process of thawing and refreezing does not in itself make fruits and vegetables unsafe.

Refrozen vegetables may toughen and refrozen fruits become soft and mushy.

Because low-acid foods, which include most vegetables, spoil fast after they have thawed and warmed up to temperatures above 45 degrees.
