

Announcement was made this week of the appointment of Arthur Ross, Jr., of Independence Township as chairman of the 1956 United Fund Campaign. The announcement came shortly after the setting of a \$75,000 campaign goal, the highest ever set for a single year by the organization.

A total of 40 voluntary service organizations will participate in this year's appeal, which is scheduled for the months of October and November. Each participating community, including Farmington, is expected to conduct its United Fund campaign effort during the two month period.

In accepting the appointment as chairman, Mr. Ross indicated that he would give immediate attention to developing a strong campaign committee whose job it will be to coordinate the efforts of all parts of the county organization and develop the tools necessary to implement the efforts of each community. The dollar goal this year is higher than at any

previous time and it is essential that we keep pace and move ahead with it," he said. "This means that we need an increased effort and a planned effort. To the contributor, the United Campaign offers the opportunity to plan his giving and fulfill his responsibilities to his community and his fellow man. Planned giving on the part of all is the literal key to our success this year," he concluded.

Mr. Ross has served as a member of the board of directors and the executive committee of the Township United Fund for three years, and during the last two years he has additionally served as campaign chairman of the Independence Township United Fund Drive. He is a district sales representative for Electro Refractories and Abrasives Company.

"Keep The Change"

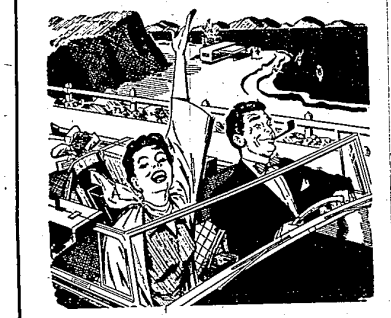
If you've seen "Mac" Johnson this week, chances are he's told you his waitress story. For those who haven't heard:

**Realtors Honor Edna Townsend**

On Thursday, June 28, at a luncheon meeting, the United Northwestern Realty Association unveiled a memorial plaque to the memory of their deceased executive secretary, Miss Edna Townsend. The bronze plaque which will be hung permanently at the central office of the Association, 1920 Grand River, carried the inscription: "A Devoted Friend to all Who Knew Her."

The plaque was presented to E. Gordon Sinclair, president of the UNRA, by Otto Schultz of the Gordon Williamson Company. Mr. John A. Blaska, assistant pastor at St. Mary's of Redford Church and the Reverend Victor F. Halboth, pastor of Grace Lutheran Church of Redford, presented eulogies to Miss Townsend's 35 years of faithful service to the UNRA and her community. She served as executive secretary of the UNRA from 1920 until her death in November of 1955.

In 1951 she was named by the Sororinit Club of Detroit as one of the 250 most outstanding women of Detroit to be honored during Detroit's Jubilee Year.

Among the guests at the dedication ceremonies were Miss Townsend's brother, Russell, Jr., of Alpena; Mrs. Robert Townsend and her son, Bob, of Detroit; Mrs. Rita Hudson of Detroit, and Charles H. Sill of the University of Michigan.

Reveal Over 80,000 Have 2 Or 3 Polio Shots In County

The following figures represent the total number of children and pregnant women in Oakland County who have received two or three injections of Salk Polio Vaccine. This total covers the period from the 1954 Field Vaccine Trials up to July 1, 1956.

5,321 children have been given three injections and are completely protected. This number includes those inoculated in 1955. 75,000 children have been given two injections. Approximately 15,000 of this number will probably have received the third injection before the onset of the 1956 polio season.

It is estimated that approximately 21 per cent of the children in the eligible age group and pregnant women have received three injections and approximately 35 per cent of the same group have received two injections to date.

From January 1 to July 1 of this year eight cases of polio were reported in Oakland County. Five of these cases were children in the age group eligible to receive the Salk vaccine. Two of the five cases were reported as paralytic polio.

It was emphasized, however, that none of the five children had received the protection of the vaccine.

Parents in the county are urged to see that all eligible children, those from ages one through 14, begin immunization promptly before the onset of the 1956 polio season.

Although asbestos cement siding requires no paint for preservation, it may be painted if a color change is desired. Motion made by Chapman and seconded by Cavanaugh that \$4,500.00 be paid to Mr. and Mrs. Adams for the designated Sewage Disposal Pumping Station site. Roll Call: Cavanaugh, Bates, Chapman, Lindbert. Motion carried, all yeas.

And that City Manager be authorized to proceed with closing of said site.

Motion made by Bates and seconded by Chapman that the Planning Commission be instructed to amend SUBPARAGRAPH (h) of SUBSECTION 9 (MOTOR SUPPLY STATIONS AND SERVICES) OF ARTICLE IV OF ORDINANCE C-49-56 known as Zoning Ordinance of the City of Farmington; be introduced as follows:

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

That sub-paragraph (h) of subsection 9, Motor Supply Stations and Services of Section 14.10 Article IV of Ordinance No. C-49-56 known as the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Farmington and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

(h) All gasoline and other combustible fuels used to propel internal combustion motors must be kept in subterranean storage tanks, not less than 3 feet below the surface of the ground and not less than 4 feet from any lot line; said storage tank shall be constructed with sand or gravel or other loose earth and no part shall extend under any paving or building or other permanent permanent structure or material.
