

Zoning Hearing Set For August 16

A public hearing on two proposed amendments to the Township Zoning Ordinance will be held on August 16, Edward Schmid, Chairman of the Zoning Board, announced this week.

The purpose of the hearing will be to record any objections which may be raised regarding the proposed changes. It is expected that the Zoning Board will submit its recommendations on the amendments immediately following the hearing, which will be held in the Town Hall. The final decision on the proposed changes rests with the Township Board.

Both proposals were initiated by action of the Township Board and filed with the Zoning Board this week. The first amendment involves a change in the wording of the ordinance to allow for the construction of homes for the aged in residential zones, subject to the approval of the Zoning Board Appeals. The members of the Zoning Board had previously recommended that this proposal be rejected. The amendment would clear the way for the erection of the Baptist Manor, proposed to be built on 13 Mile Road between Orchard Lake Road and Middlebelt.

The second amendment involves the rezoning from Residential to Commercial of Lots 1 and 2 of Supervisors Ten Mile - Middlebelt Subdivision. The lots are located on the northwest corner of Middlebelt and Ten Mile Road.

storage tanks of that size are not permitted in that area under present zoning laws. Authorization to proceed with the fencing of the bus parking lot at the school was also requested by the Board. It was determined that the present garage is in poor condition and that it would be unwise to appropriate additional funds to repair it. The old garage is presently being used to house school equipment, tractors, and the new driver training cars.

Other improvement projects discussed by the Board included repairing of the ceiling in the library of the high school, venting the kitchen at Bond School, and the installation of outside lights at the Kendall School.

Three new elementary schools. Action to either improve the present band house or take steps to dispose of the building as previously suggested was tabled for later consideration.

A report on school site negotiations revealed that surveys have been requested on the additional two acres authorized for purchase at the Kendall School site. Earl Meyer, architect, is proceeding with preliminary plans for the new elementary school to be constructed there. A value of \$7,000 was placed on the additional land under negotiations at the William Grace site. The Board authorized the purchase of the property.

Early negotiations with the Farmington City Council for a parcel of city-owned land for the third site were unfavorable. A report to the Board revealed. The Council will formally consider the matter at its next meeting on Monday, July 16.

Board members promised to be present in an effort to convince the Council of the need for the site. The presence of Archie Leonard, School Attorney, was also requested.

Following discussion, the school tax rate for this year was officially set at \$1.00 assessed valuation as equalized. The levy on the 1956 bond issue was raised from 2.82 mills to 3.0 mills by action of the Board. The slight increase was deemed necessary to provide a better cushion for paying off indebtedness without complications in the event of a heavier than usual tax payment delinquency.

Two requests for enrollment of non-resident students were discussed. One request, permitting a girl to finish her senior year here, was granted without further request for three elementary students, living just outside of the District, to continue their studies here was denied. A definite policy permitting only seniors who have been enrolled in the school for two years prior to their senior year to conclude their studies here was established.

In other action Archie Leonard was employed as School Attorney for the coming year and authorization was granted to complete payment for the new Junior High School site and a parcel of land from the Detroit Edison Company.

The date for the next meeting of the Board was changed from Friday, July 28, to Thursday, July 26, because of conflicting schedules by some members of the Board.

proving the allocation. Schulkins also asked what action had been taken in regard to a previous request for a foot bridge over Farmington Expressway in the vicinity of Parker. Cairns stated that the matter was discussed with both the County Road Commission and an official of the State Highway Department but no definite decision was made. It was also agreed to contact the County again regarding the expenditure of money already allocated for road repairs in the Township.

In connection with the Planning Board report, Eagle stated that the Township officials met with the Planning Board Monday evening for the purpose of discussing problems of procedure and cooperation. He expressed the hope that the meeting will result in a better understanding of the mutual problems of the two groups. Eagle stated that it was decided to have a member of the Township Board attend the Planning Board meetings as a means of establishing better coordination.

At the request of Albert Gain, Township Building Inspector, the Board approved a motion setting a 30-day limit for action on condemned buildings. According to the motion, owners of condemned property have 30 days from the date of posting to correct the hazard or face legal action. Gains also pointed out that steps should be taken to eliminate the existence of junk cars scattered on private property throughout the Township. It was suggested that the Township Police contact the owners and request that the cars be removed.


Hattie DeVriendt Heads Women's Policy Committee
