

The tallest active volcano is Lascar in Chile, which last erupted in 1951. It is 19,652 feet above sea level.

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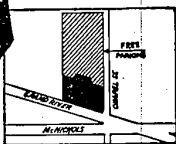

are our greatest ally, deprivation spokesmen say. They recommend that all camp fires be promptly drenched with water or covered with dirt, bottles or other glass containers be left in waste cans or specified dumps; care be used with cigarettes and matches.

ONLY ONE AMENDMENT to the state constitution will be brought before the voter in the fall elections.

All groups desiring amendments failed to file the required number of petition signatures by the July 6 deadline.

As a result, only the single proposal submitted by the state legislature last spring will come to the voters' attention.

This amendment specifies a minimum age of 21 for all legislators and disqualifies persons convicted of felonies involving breach of the public trust or subversion from being a member of the legislature.

NOMINATING CONVENTIONS for both Michigan political parties will be held in Grand Rapids late in the summer.

Democrats meet first on August 25 to select their state ticket. Republicans invade the city a week later on September 1.

Both parties must hurry from their respective national conventions to set up state tickets. Democrats meet in Chicago August 14. Republicans hold their national convention in San Francisco on August 20.

HUNT REGULATIONS ON WOODCOCK, RAILS, GALLINULES SET UP

Hunting regulations on woodcock, rails and gallinules will be only slightly changed from last year, according to a recent announcement from the U. S. Department of Interior.

Federal regulations on woodcock are unchanged and Michigan will use the same seasons as last year, October 1 to November 1 in the upper peninsula, October 1 to November 9 in the northern lower peninsula, and October 20 to November 9 in the southern lower peninsula.

The daily bag limit of four woodcock and the possession limit of eight will remain in effect. Bag and possession limits of rails and gallinules also are the same as last season: rails (except sora) and gallinules, 15 per day and 15 in possession; sora and mallards, 25 per day and 25 in possession.

Michigan will set its seasons to coincide with hunting regulations on ducks, geese and other migratory waterfowl, to be announced later.

## Minor Changes In Game Laws In Effect This Year

Grouse hunters will be limited to three "spots" per day in the northern lower peninsula this fall, two less than the bag limit of Zone 11 last year. Also, black squirrels will be legal game under provisions of a new law this year in all counties except Clare, Cheboygan and Isabella.

The upper peninsula will have a September 1 to 15 bear season, an extension of the restricted Chippewa County season of last year. A brief pheasant season, new this year, will be held in the Escanaba County west of the Escanaba River.

These are the only major changes in small game hunting regulations by the Conservation Commission at its July 12-13 meeting at Higgins Lake training school. Deer and waterfowl regulations will be discussed at the Commission's August 8-10 meeting.
