Rev. Boehmke To Be Commissioned As Township Lutheran Missionary

The Rev. A. Karl Boehmke will
be commissioned as Missionary in
the Farmington Township area by
the Lutheran Church, Missouri Syn-
od, at 4 p.m. Sunday, July 29.
The announcement was made by
the Rev. O. T. McRee, Mission Di-
rector, who will perform the rite of
commissioning. The service
will be held at Grace Lutheran
Church, 25630 Grand River, Red-
ford.

The Rev. Edwin E. Pieplow of
Christ Lutheran Church, Detroit,
will officiate at the vesper serv-
ice. Chaplain (Captain) John W.
Freed, U. S. Air Force chaplain
from Selfridge Air Force Base,
Mt. Clemens, will preach. Other
pastors of the Detroit area will as-
ist in the commissioning.

Rev. Boehmke was born in But-
talo, New York. He studied at
Concordia College, Bronxville,
New York, and at Concordia Theo-
logical Seminary, St. Louis, Mis-
souri, being ordained into the min-
istry in 1944. His theological in-
ternship was served in Kansas
City, Missouri. He served as mis-
sionary pastor in the Washington,
D. C., area from 1944 to 1950,
founding Pilgrim Lutheran congre-
gation. He was Lutheran chaplain
to the District of Columbia Home
for the Aged and Infirm.

Mr. Boehmke was commissioned
in the United States Air Force Re-
serve in February, 1950, and was
called to active duty the same
year, upon outbreak of hostilities
in Korea. He served as chaplain
with the Military Air Transport
Service at Westover Air Force
Base, Massachusetts, and at Ter-
raciera, Azores. Released from
active duty in 1952, he has since
been active with the Air Force
Reserve training program, serving
as chaplain with the 88th Air
Despot Wing, New York City, and
currently with the 439th Fighter
Bomber Wing, Selfridge Field.

He attended Yale Divinity
School, New Haven, Connecticut,
in 1952 and 1953, majoring in the
Sociology of Religion, and com-
pleting his thesis on "Visitation
Evangelism in the American
Churches." He received the Master
of Sacred Theology degree in
1955. He has been a contributor
to the "Concordia Theological
Monthly." From 1953 to 1956, he
served as pastor at Calvary Luth-
eran Church, Leonia, New Jersey,
a suburb of New York City. In
this area he was active as an in-
structor at regional Bible insti-
tutes and laymen's retreats.

Rev. Boehmke is married to the
former LaVerne Telle of St. Louis.
They have three children: Sharon,
10; Karl, 7; and Anne, 4. All parts
are stocked at the Ford Parts De-
pot in Plymouth Road at Middle-
belt.

DOCTORS DISCUSS OLD AGE, URGE WEIGHT CONTROL

Although overweight persons
have a shorter life expectancy,
most people approaching retire-
ment age are overweight. A prop-
er diet is one key to happy and
healthy living in old age.

This was one of the points
driven home by medical and ger-
ontological experts at the Univer-
sity of Michigan's ninth annual
conference on aging, held recent-
ly at the university.

Another was that senior citizens
must avoid apathy, described by
Dr. Edward L. Bortz of Philadel-
phia as "the major cause of old
age."

A third was that age alone is not
a proper criterion for retirement,
but that individual ability was
more important. Scientists found
that in many cases an older person
is more qualified to do certain
work than a younger person.

Dr. Lawrence F. Segar suggested
a minimal daily diet for older
people without disease that mod-
ified requirements as follows: one
pint of milk, a 16-ounce serving of
orange juice, three servings of
vegetables (one of which should be
green), two eggs, one serving of
meat or fish, and two pats of
butter or fortified margarine. Un-
dernutrition and obesity are both
threats to longevity, Dr. Segar
said.

Dr. Charles Sellers of Detroit
warned that persons who fail to
adjust emotionally to retirement
and find new interests usually live
for only two years after complete
idleness has set in.

Dr. Bortz suggested that older
people find new interests in edu-
cation, to find new outlets for
mature minds.

Dr. William B. Kountz, Wash-
ington University professor and
president of the American Geron-
tological Society, reported that
the biological deterioration of
body cells and tissues may be re-
versed so that the tissues regain
their former function and appear-
ance. This can already be demon-
strated with certain tissues, he
added.

To encourage further study of
old age problems and public sup-
port for legislative and individual
action, a Michigan State Gerontol-
ogical Society will be formed by a
13-member committee.
