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Seeks Nomination As County Drain Commissioner

Seeking election as County Drain Commissioner on the Republican ticket in the coming election is John G. Semann of Berkeley.

Associated with the real estate and appraisal business, Semann has been a member of the County Drain Committee for the past eight years and is presently serving as chairman. In past years he has served as a branch manager of the Secretary of State's office and as an accountant and public relations executive. Semann has been on the Berkeley City Council for five years and on the County Board of Supervisors for eight years. He is also a member of the Berkeley Exchange Club and the Berkeley Chamber of Commerce.

Semann has served as chairman of the Oakland County Republican Committee and chairman of the Red Cross.

"As a member and presently as chairman of the Oakland County Drain Committee, I have come in contact with some of the major problems confronting Oakland County," Semann stated.

"We have at the present time an inter-county committee consisting of one member from each of six counties who have requested that the National Sanitation Foundation make a study of our sewage disposal needs. The cost of the study (\$100,000) is to be supplied by industry. This report we should have in 60 days. To the writer, this is all important to all six counties and especially to Oakland County.

"Our county is noted for its multitude of inland lakes and numerous fresh water streams. These recreational assets and natural resources should be protected and preserved. The future of our county should be built around these resources.

"The Drain Committee has requested a joint meeting of the Drain Commissioner, Drain Committee, Ways and Means Committee, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, and representatives of the Greater Detroit Builders' Association. It is the desire of the Drain Committee to formulate a plan to unite as many municipal and private sewage disposal systems under one authority as is possible. This could be accomplished along the same lines as our other successful Authorities. And furthermore, such a plan would not hinder the progress made on the Twelve Towns and other systems.

"Metropolitan Detroit's greatest residential growth will be in Oakland County. This growth will demand construction of major highways as well as many other utilities and our sewage disposal authority should work along with all of them. Each new development adds to the danger of polluting our fresh waters, and endangers the health of every family in the area.

"I intend to devote as much time as possible to work out a cooperative plan with all municipalities, cities and counties and all developers, residential and industrial to guard against any destruction of our most valuable asset.

"I believe we can accomplish this without too much cost by co-operating now on proper and adequate planning for the future, rather than waiting until the problem is real."

Curt Hall Pontiac Agency Sold, New Owners To Take Over Aug. 1

Announcement was made this week of the sale of the Curt Hall Pontiac Auto Agency at 33224 Grand River Avenue in Farmington to Karl Vangoff and Andrew Nadol of the Detroit area by Curt Hall, owner and operator of the business.

It was indicated that the new owners have obtained a franchise for the sale of Dodge and Plymouth automobiles in Farmington. They will take over the Curt Hall Agency on August 1. The new business will be known as Farmington Sales and Service.

Hall started in the automobile business in Farmington in 1934, handling auto sales and service. He bought out the Ford agency here in 1939 and continued to sell Dodge until 1947, when he changed over to the Pontiac line.

Prior to entering the automobile field, Hall served as a teacher and coach in the Farmington School system.

Active in the Community, Curt Hall served on the Farmington School Board from 1950 through 1952 and was president of that group. He also served on the City Board of Appeals for several years. The Halls made their home at 23701 Wilmarth Street in Farmington until recently when they moved to Bloomfield Village. A member of the Farmington Exchange Club for several years, he also served as club president.

Hall indicated that his future plans are still indefinite but that he would not be retiring and that he was hopeful of starting in another business venture in this area.

Most of the personnel at the agency will be retained by the new owners. Hall revealed, however, that James Lucy, sales manager, will be leaving to start his own Chevrolet dealership in Cookeville, Tennessee, and that John Breeff, office manager, will take a similar position with the R & D Tool Company.

In a concluding statement, Hall extended regrets that he would be leaving his many associates and friends here. He stated that he had greatly enjoyed working with the people of Farmington during the past years in both community and business activities.

Council will survey the city-owned property as well as other possible sites in the general area. School officials have stated that there is an urgent need for a grade school building in the southern portion of the City. They have pointed out that the specific location is necessary because of the increased population in the area as well as the growing costs of transportation.

The 1956 bond issue provides for the construction of a new junior high school building and three elementary buildings. Two grade school sites have been secured in the Township with one planned for the City.
