Two Area Families Become Foster Parents Of 12 Year Old Greek Boy

Life will be made considerably
brighter for a 12 year old Greek
boy by the name of Haralambos
Vassilatos of Piraeus, port of Athens,
Greece, by the joint charitable
actions of two area families.

Announcement was made last
week of the joint adoption of
Haralambos, nicknamed Lambis
by Mr. and Mrs. Roy Sherpitis of
33025 Kirby Street Farmington
and Mr. and Mrs. Robert H. Zimmerman of 17233 Kinloch, Detroit.

Both Mr. Zimmerman and
Mr. Sherpitis are instructors in
the Farmington Catholic Schools.
The announcement was made by
headquarters of the Foster Parents'
Plan at 43 West 61st Street,
New York 23, New York, through
which the adoption arrangements
were made.

Each month the boy will receive
\$9 cash from the Foster Parents'
Plan, Inc., as contributed by the
Sherpitis and Zimmermans. He
will also receive parcels of food,
new clothing, shoes, and a wool
blanket. Spiritual needs will also
be provided.

Lambis is the youngest of four
children. He has three brothers,
Dionysios, 10, Gherassimos, 17,
and Konstantinos, 14. They live
with their mother in Piraeus.
Lambis's parents were married in
1925. His father worked as a
stoker, travelling abroad much of
the time. He used to send money
for the family's upkeep but, in
1946, he abandoned them completely.
The mother suspects that he
has remarried in some foreign
country.

The family lives on a small
monthly subsidy of \$3.33 which
they receive from the local welfare
center. They receive irregular
aid from the church and some
charitable women in the area.
Lambis's mother had been ill with
tuberculosis and now suffers from
arthritis and a weak heart. She
is unable to work. Dionysios has
recently been discharged from the
hospital where he was treated for
tuberculosis of the bone of his
knee. He is not yet able to work.
The two other brothers are students,
attending without charge
because they are residents of the
area. Gherassimos is in the Professional
School and Konstantinos is
in the School of Mechanics.
There was a daughter in the family
who died in 1948.

The only close relative the fam-

ily has is the mother's brother.
He is unable to help, having lost
his house in the earthquakes of 1933.

The family lives in an old house
made up of two rooms and a small
kitchen. There is also a yard
which they use in common with
other families who live close by.
Rent for the house is \$3 per
month and the family is on poor
terms with the landlord because
they owe him four months' rent.
The floor is wooden and in poor
condition. The roof leaks. The
place is very bare and unfurnished.
Electricity and running water are
provided. All of the family is in
great need.

Haralambos is a polite, good-
looking boy with brown eyes and
light brown hair. An intelligent

Farmington.

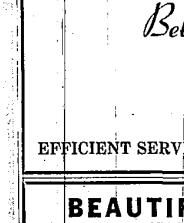

PREPARING MEAT

The less tender cuts of meats
which usually require long moist
cooking should be treated to a ten-
derizing period before barbecuing.
This is done by marinating the
meat for 12-48 hours depending
on the size and thickness of the
pieces, in a food acid preparation
in the refrigerator. Food acids
that might be used include lemon
juice, vinegar, wine or tomato
juice. These foods, in combination
with seasoning, break down the
meat fibers as well as impart a
distinctive flavor to the meat. Two
practical and easy marinating
preparations are French dressing
and barbecue sauce.

A new policy is being establish-
ed by the Farmington Library to
facilitate services in keeping with
Farmington's growth and in-
creased use of the library. Officials
pointed out that borrowing cards
will now be issued to patrons.

After September 1 patrons will
be requested to present their
cards when borrowing or return-
ing a book. Original library cards
and copies from them will be
issued free, officials stated. There
will be a fee for duplicate cards,
however, or in cases where the
original card is lost, they added.

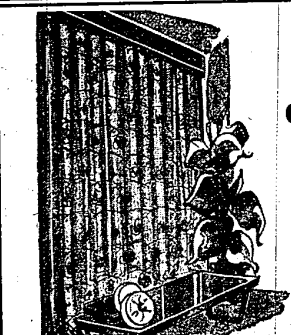
