Southfield now can boast its first women's state bowling champion.

When the final pin fell in the long drawn out state tournament at Kalamazoo a week ago, Rose Abrahamian, of Southfield, was the regular events champion with a nine game count of 1813.

The tournament had been running since February and every top woman bowler in the state had taken a turn on the approach.

But it remained for Rose to bring the metropolitan area its only champion. It was the first time in several years the metropolitan area fared so poorly.

The three are Ken Delor of Grosse Pointe, Greg Meyer of Grand Rapids and Andy Johnson of Mansfield, Ohio.

Farmer is the Michigan state champ in the quarter mile, running 38.9 in the state finals, and he also anchored his Grosse Pointe North team to the mile relay title.

Schoolcraft College's seventh annual summer music festival will open on Tuesday, July 3, with the first of three chamber music concerts to be presented by the faculty of the summer music school.

All programs in the series will be presented at 8 p.m. in the Veterans Campus Center, 19800 Schoolcraft, Livonia, on successive Tuesday evenings through July 24.

This year, the festival will conclude with a concert by the Festival Court Orchestra.

The faculty, composed of members of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and the college staff, will perform a variety of works for different combinations of instruments.

The July 3 program will open with "Overture on Hebrew Melodies" by Ernest Bloch, performed by Oliver Green, clarinetist; Allen Shaffer, pianist; and the Schoolcraft Festival String Quartet.

The quartet, which is becoming well-known in the Detroit area, consists of James Waring and Inez Hui-

linger Redman, violinists; David Ireland, violist; and Mario Di Fiore, cellist.

The program will include Mozart's String Quartet No. 21 in D major, K. 575, and the Quintet in E flat major, Opus 71, for Winds.

Percussionist Norman Fickett will be featured in the "Suite for Percussion" by Armand Russell.

The July 10 program will open with the Quintet in F major for Oboe, String Trio and Piano by J. C. Bach with soloists David Mariotti and Robert W. Jones.

Pianists Donald Morelock and Allen Shaffer will perform the Fantasy in F minor by Schubert for piano duo.

The highlight of the program will be a chamber version, for five solo instruments, of Richard Strauss's popular orchestra tone poem "Till Eulenspiegel's Merry Pranks."

The final chamber concert, on July 17, will open with Morelock's performance of the Piano Sonata No. 12 in F major, K. 323, by Mozart.

Morelock has just returned from Vienna where he participated in a month-long workshop with Mozart and Schubert specialist Paul Badura-Skoda.

The Festival Woodwind Quintet will be joined by pianist Shaffer for a performance of Poulenc's Sextet for Piano and Winds, and the Schoolcraft String Quartet, will conclude the chamber series with Beethoven's Quartet No. 9 in C major, Opus 59, "Rasoumovsky."

The Festival Woodwind Quintet consists of Clement Barone, flute; Mariotti, oboe; Green, clarinet; Paul Ganson, bassoon; and Eugene Wade, French horn.

The Festival Court Orchestra will again be under the baton of Richard Saunders, director of the summer music school and festival, and will conclude the festival with a concert on Tuesday, July 24.

The program will feature the Symphony No. 29 in A major, K. 201, by Mozart; the "Siegfried Idyll" by Wagner in its original version for 15 solo instruments; and "Divertissement" by Jacques Ibert.

The court orchestra is made up of members of the Detroit Symphony with the summer music school faculty assuming the first desks.

YPSILANTI will open a workshop in theater for high school students will be offered at Eastern Michigan University this summer. It will run from Aug. 5-18.

The workshop will be directed by M.R. McElroy, associate professor of speech and dramatic arts. Robert Kayler, head of drama at Berkshire College, Reading, and J.P. Bunc, head of drama at Great Missenden Secondary School, both in England, will join McElroy as members of the summer faculty.
