and the burley people wanted it too. We want to see what happens when you get all allotments leveled down to 5/10 of an acre, for example. It's as invariable as the law of gravity. But it is political law, the law of equal shares: when you set a high price support and allocate legislatively the right to produce, everyone should know what to expect.

Yes, the "fair shares" or "equal shares" proposition is the political doctrine of the British Socialist Party (and of Karl Marx) - written boldly into their platform. And Mr. Fleming emphasizes that the experience in burley tobacco is a leveling out pattern that would apply to any other commodity under a sustained high price support and acreage allotment program. Think of it: seventy-five per cent of all production in burley already is in little plots! The resultant inefficiency is reflected in the higher price paid by consumers who use tobacco products. It would be the same with any product "leveling" under government control.

The potato situation is being eased by the new Michigan crop now starting to market. By August 15 good supplies of Onaway and Cobler varieties will be available.

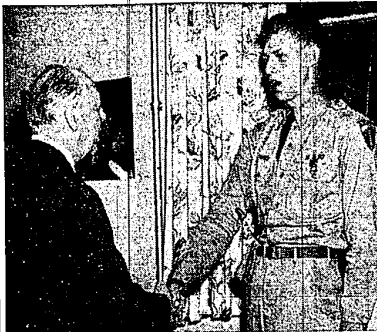

poses, picturing Michigan as a bad place to do business.

Republican leaders feel that the governor could well take note of his phrase "trying to create a fear psychology for political purposes," when he tries to reconcile his stands that business is "good" but employment is "bad."

"THINGS COULD BE BETTER" in Michigan's tourist industry, say state officials. They admit that unseasonably cool summer weather prevents any possible repetition of last year's 600 million dollar tourist record.

"There's plenty of tourist movement, but people are not staying long in any one place," says Robert Furlong, executive secretary of the state Tourist Council. "They try out one resort, get discouraged by the weather in a couple of days and move on. Some of them go home and some of them just drive around the state."

The coolest July in many years is a prime reason for the slump. Temperatures over 90 degrees were recorded only twice during the month, according to weather officials. The average fell far below normal.

No areas are especially hard hit, Furlong states. But tourist business is down in all parts of the state.

Ending on a note of optimism Furlong states, "The forecast is for warmer weather during August, I understand, and that would certainly help."

Michigan State University agricultural experiment station has unwrapped a new early potato called Onaway. It is a white, smooth, scab resistant potato that has been developed after many years of plant breeding. At present, most potatoes of the Onaway variety are being grown in the Munger area of Bay County.
