For four years Woodcreek ladies have maintained the sky watch post for the Ground Observer Corps one day every other week. While this is a community project, out of nearly 100 women in Woodcreek it seems to have fallen on about 20 Woodcreek women to keep this civic service functioning.

Certainly none of us can doubt the importance of this duty. The Corps maintains that it cannot adequately protect us without the aid of the Ground Observer Corps. Our radar installations are effective only about 100 miles. Therefore, Air Force must rely on our Ground Observer Corps to protect us below that altitude. The radio, the television, and the Press are not reliable. We are constantly emphasizing the need for Air Spotters.

Trotting Derby Set At Hazel Park Aug. 23

The \$10,000 Detroit Trotting Derby will be held Thursday, August 23, at Hazel Park. At least ten highly rated trotters are slated to go to the post in two one-mile dashes.

The first time since the event was inaugurated at Hazel Park, it will be raced over the mile instead of the traditional mile and one-quarter of past years. One other change is the switching of the race from a single dash to two dashes. The same change has been made in the Detroit Trotting Derby which will go to Hazel Park on Thursday, August 30.

Racing at Hazel Park continues through Saturday, September 22. There is racing rain or shine every night except Sunday. The track is located at East Ten Mile and Dequindre Roads in Hazel Park.

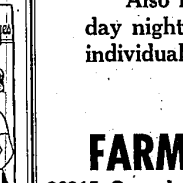

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THREE NEW TYPES OF AUTO ENGINES NOW ON HORIZON

The first automobile manufacturer to produce a workable, powerful and economical successor to the present internal-combustion gasoline engine may put his competitors in the shade, say the editors of "Changing Times," the Kiplinger Magazine.

Three types of engines may fill the bill: the gas-turbine engine, the free-piston engine and the fuel-injection engine. Only the latter type can claim any relationship to engines now in use. Last year cars, such as Continentals and Cadillacs, may be equipped with it next year. A refinement of the motor in your present car, it has no carburetor; the fuel is sprayed directly into the cylinders. The result is fuel economy, improved acceleration and smoother operation.

Experimentation with the gas turbine has been extensive, but you won't see it in cars for at least another five years. It requires only one-fifth the number of parts in a piston engine and weighs a third as much, needs only one spark plug, gets along without a radiator or conventional cooling system and uses a cheap fuel. At present, the cost of producing the motors is prohibitive since fantastically expensive metals are needed to sustain the 1,600-degree heat created.

The free-piston engine has been successfully operated with cheap fuels, including peanut oil. It needs even fewer parts than a gas-turbine engine and is almost vibration-free. And it can be made of conventional metals, since it does not work up excessive heat. But it still has lots of bugs in it.

What about atomic-powered engines? Scientists brush off any suggestions that atomic-powered cars are just over the horizon. They are not even sure such cars are possible. It's hard enough, they say, to harness atoms for locomotives, airplanes and steamships.

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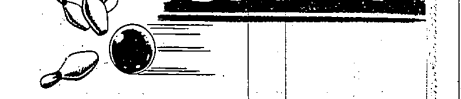
