Start Campaign Against Littering Highways In Area

Mrs. W. Allen Nelson, president of the Farmington Garden Club, has discussed with Chief of Police Joseph G. DeVriendt a more vigorous enforcement of the state law against littering our highways.

"The law," Mrs. Nelson said, "provides a fine up to \$100, plus the costs of prosecution, and default of payment can mean up to 90 days in jail."

The Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan, the National Farm and Garden Association, and the Garden Club of Michigan have joined forces in a statewide campaign to abolish the "litter bug," who mars the beauty of highways and roadsides by throwing all kinds of trash out of automobiles.

"The cost of cleaning up this unnecessary and unsightly mess would build several miles of new highway each year," Mrs. Nelson stated.

The Farmington Garden Club, along with other clubs throughout the state, is appealing to every car owner to carry a litter bag in the car and stop throwing litter on highways. An effort is being made by the garden club members to prevail upon car manufacturers to provide a litter container as standard equipment on cars. In the meantime, litter bags are being made by the Detroit Society of Handicapped and by private business firms and can be obtained. "Even a paper bag will suffice," Mrs. Nelson said.

"Chief of Police DeVriendt has promised the full support of his organization in apprehending violators of the state law against littering our highways," Mrs. Nelson told The Enterprise.

ICE CREAM SODA ORIGINATED IN DETROIT AS THE RESULT OF AN ELECTRICAL STORM

Seventy-five years ago, during a cream-curdling electrical storm, the ice cream soda came to Detroit.

The originator was Frederick Sanders, founder of the present multiple store Fred Sanders organization, then proprietor of a sweet shop in the Fisher Block at Woodward and Michigan Avenues, on the north of a site now occupied by the Majestic Building.

The sweet shop was a popular rendezvous for Detroiters back in the 1880s and an afternoon promenade along Woodward Avenue was not complete without a stop there for one of Sanders' sodas made of flavored syrup, sweet cream and soda water.

The sweet shop was packed with people that muggy August afternoon back in 1881 when the ice

PLANT 2,300 TIGER MUSKELLUNGE IN EXPERIMENT

Conservation Department fish workers recently completed planting of more than 2,300 tiger muskellunge in Spider Lake, Grand Traverse County, as part of an experimental muskie research program.

The fish were hatched from eggs obtained from spawning muskies netted in several lakes in Gogebie County. When planted the muskies were two months old and averaged about four inches in length.

Spider Lake was selected as a planting site after fish division personnel studied recommendations from field workers. The 550-acre lake, near Traverse City, is considered biologically suited for muskellunge.

The muskie plantings also tie in with a management program at Spider Lake designed to control excessive panfish populations. The experimental muskie-rearing work is being carried on at Wolf Lake hatchery near Kalamazoo. Department fish specialists at Oden also hatched some Great Lakes muskies earlier this year, and planted the young fish in the Indian River.

cream soda, now an American institution, made its first appearance in Detroit. It might not have happened if a terrific electrical storm, accompanied by booming thunder, had not curdled the sweet cream that was an integral part of the sodas.

"What to do about the sweltering patrons who came into the sweet shop clamoring for sweet cream sodas?" Frederick Sanders was not one to lose a customer and he realized that this was a time for action. With ice cream scoop in hand he announced to his customers that the sweet cream had soured, "But I've something you might like just as well."

Sanders reasoned that ice cream was just as sweet, if not sweeter, than sweet cream, and what's more it would make the soda cooler. His employees were not so sure, but this was no time for hesitation. "There were 'oohs' and 'ahs' as the customers sampled the new concoction. It hit their palates right and pleased their taste buds."

By word of mouth and advertisements in the newspapers the news spread like wildfire and soon Detroiters were thronging to the sweet shop in increased numbers to taste the new ice cream soda.

The fame of the ice cream soda spread to other cities and before long it was pleasing American tastes from coast to coast. During the G.A.R. Encampment in Detroit in 1901 Sanders served 10,000 ice cream sodas in one day.

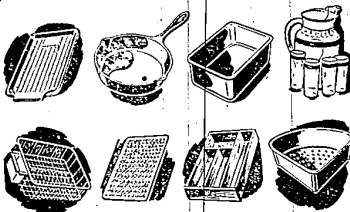

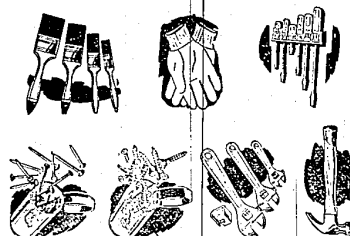

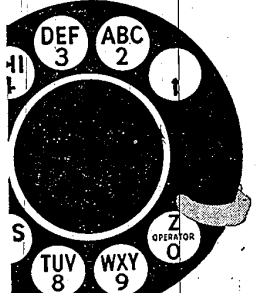
