Group Prepares
Operation Manual
On Townships

A pocket-sized manual of Michigan township board operations is being prepared by state officials and Michigan State University specialists.

Available by mid-November, the manual will detail township board powers, duties, methods of procedure and parliamentary rules, according to Prof. Norton E. Long, acting director of the sponsoring Governmental Bureau at MSU.

D. Hale Brake, president of the Michigan Institute of Local Government, and William J. Dennison, secretary-treasurer of the Michigan Association of Township Supervisors, are participating in the project.

The manual's author is Dr. James L. Blawie, attorney and member of the MSU political science department. He is a specialist in local government and public law.

A three-part township survey is the basis of the new manual. The first step, nearly completed, involves gathering and analyzing all relevant legislation, court decisions and printed matter. Then Dennison and Dr. Blawie have been interviewing outstanding township board members. The final task will be writing, editing, publishing and distributing the book.

"This is a research job which has been needed for a long time," Dennison commented. "The manual will combine the law, traditions and day-to-day practices of the board into an understandable, easy-to-read outline for ready reference."

The study will extend over a 60-day period, according to the director.

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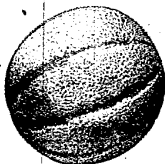
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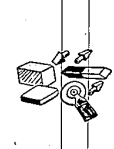
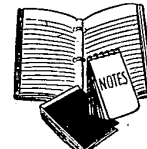
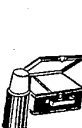
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
