

Seaway Will Require New College Business Courses

The St. Lawrence Seaway project will require American colleges and universities to change their courses of study to meet its new challenges, a Michigan State University professor has stated.

A new course in international business law should be added to business administration programs, Dr. Hendrik Zwarenstein recently told members of the American Business Law association.

To be ready for the "run on the world trade" in 1959 when the seaway will be completed, we should be preparing ourselves now, he said.

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MSU TO ENROLL MORE THAN 18,500 FOR FALL TERM

A changing Michigan State University campus awaits the largest student body in the university's history.

More than 18,500 students are registering the week of September 16 for the fall term will find new classroom space completed by the music building addition and the Ernest L. Anthony Hall for animal industries.

A new College of Education building and Student Services structure are in beginning stages of construction, joining stadium and student health center additions on the list of campus buildings in progress.

Work also continues on new married student housing units and the university golf course. The new library, opened spring term, faces its first full academic year.

When classes begin September 29, an estimated 8,000 MSU students will be living in university housing, up 800 from a year ago and the largest total in MSU history.

Boosting the men's housing total to about 4,500 is the completion of the final three units in the Brody dormitory group near Kellogg Center. Six dormitories surround a central eating area.

Married students—who now constitute about 25 per cent of the total enrollment, according to housing director Tom Dutch—have 176 new furnished brick apartments available this fall in addition to 450 previously in service in University Village, and 1,100 barracks apartments. Other units are under construction.

But the waiting list for married student housing is 25 per cent larger than last year due to increased enrollment, Dutch reported.

Automobile Club Says State Parks Need Improving

Automobile Club of Michigan says Michigan's State Parks System deplorably inadequate and labeled the present land acquisition program too slow to keep up with present needs, let alone future population growth.

"We have waited until after Labor Day to say this so as not to interfere with the busiest tourist season," E. J. Matheson, club general manager, said. "But every day that passes makes the situation worse."

"A study of the 350,000 travelers we served this summer has persuaded Auto Club to begin a vigorous campaign to enlist public support to rescue the state parks," Matheson said. Eighteen million persons use the parks yearly.

"Our 59 state parks and recreation areas have been a major factor in luring half of all Michigan residents to vacation within their own state, and in building a \$600 million tourist industry. Millions of Indiana, Illinois and Ohio vacationers come to Michigan yearly because of these park beauty spots."

"But now they are falling apart. Parking and picnic areas, electric facilities, camps and beach developments, are inadequate in many of the parks. Unless something is done soon Michigan's tourist business will be affected."

Michigan spends \$74.3 cents and New York 44 cents and Florida 42 cents per park visitor on capital output, operation and maintenance, Michigan spends only 13.3 cents," Matheson pointed out.

"More money is needed both for maintenance and beautification of the parks and for acquiring land for the future. Desirable recreation sites on the Great Lakes, streams and inland lakes are being swallowed up swiftly by development which prevents public use," Matheson said.

"Auto Club's Travel Department is analyzing the parks and presenting proposals for acquiring land on what is needed and suggestions on how it might be financed in the near future," Matheson said.

State business was carried on in a big scale. Expenditures amounted to \$509,600,000 during the fiscal year ending June 30. However, income for the same period was \$535,400,000—leaving the state with a tidy financial balance.

Biggest factor in providing surplus revenue is the business receipts tax. It was written into the law books in 1952 after Michigan ran into the red four consecutive years.

At that time Governor Williams was urging a corporation profits tax. The Republican controlled legislature passed the business receipts tax instead, which the governor allowed to become law without his signature.

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FLUORIDE TOOTH TREATMENT GIVEN 35,000 IN STATE

An additional 35,000 Michigan school children received top fluoride applications during the summer, bringing to 300,000 the number of children treated since summer time applications were started in Michigan in 1948.

Dr. Fred Wertheimer, director of the dentistry division of the Michigan Department of Health, said this summer's program was offered at 170 centers in 42 counties.

The summer program is organized by the Michigan Department of Health, administered and financed by local personnel, and is supervised by the state health department in cooperation with local dentists.

Applications this summer were given by 55 dental and dental hygiene students who have completed the summer program in the dental school of either the University of Michigan or the University of Detroit.

Dr. Wertheimer said the topical application program is designed to bring the benefits of fluoridation to children living in areas where drinking water does not contain fluorides or by adjusting the level by adding fluorides.

Labor Day Traffic Shows 10% Increase At Straits

Labor Day week and traffic across the Straits of Mackinac showed an increase of 10% compared to the same week and year ago, Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler announced.

For the four days starting at midnight Thursday and ending at midnight Labor Day, the Michigan State Ferries carried 30,003 vehicles across the Straits, compared to 26,367 in the same period of 1957, an increase of 2,716 vehicles.

The ferries carried 12,964 vehicles from Mackinac City and some 16,119 vehicles from St. Ignace during the four-day period this year.
