Big Evangelistic
Crusade Planned

Several from the Clarenceville area will take part in a city-wide evangelistic crusade to be held at the Metropolitan Adventist Evangelistic Auditorium, 15340 South Grand Road, one block north of Grand River, on Sunday, September 16.

Evangelist Robert L. Boothby, who started as a lay preacher and has conducted campaigns in large cities across America for 36 years, will be the speaker. Joining the campaign will be Harold G. Rutherford, assistant pastor of the Metropolitan Church, who will direct the music. Members of the Clarenceville Church will take part in the choir. Ladies of the church will be chosen as usherettes.

From the beginning of his evangelistic career, Boothby has drawn large congregations.

The Metropolitan Auditorium, recently constructed at a cost of \$400,000, can seat 1,500 people upstairs. Closed circuit TV will make the services available to more who can be seated in the basement auditorium.

Plans are under way to set up a training class to prepare 500 volunteers for personal work. These classes will be conducted on four successive Saturdays beginning September 15.

YOUNGSTERS' ART
WORKS TO GO ON
DISPLAY IN DETROIT

An art exhibit, opening September 10 at the Detroit Institute of Arts, will show the range of children's work from the naive, uninhibited approach of the younger school children to the more skilled work of high school students. The exhibit is of work from the Institute's summer series of workshops for young people. Included in the show are photographs taken during the workshop sessions by Bernice Clark, a well known Detroit photographer.

The painting, sculpture, drawings, prints and water colors are reported amazing in their technical excellence and reflect a fresh and new viewpoint. It shows the influence and stimulation of the museum collection upon the creative minds of the young artist.

The summer workshop which divided the young people into five groups, each working for about two hours once a week, was under the direction of John A. Crowley, of the Institute's education department. First and second graders looked for plants and animals that are found in the paintings and art objects in the collection; third and fourth graders enjoyed travel to foreign places through the African, Oriental, South American Indian and Egyptian galleries; fifth and sixth graders delved into the elements of design; seventh graders considered artists and materials while high school students studied the technique of sketching and oil painting.
