NEW RESCUE TRUCK FOR DISASTER WORK UNVEILED

A rescue truck designed for rushing a fully-equipped, lifesaving team over wreckage or rough terrain to the heart of any disaster area was unveiled last week by the General Motors Truck and Coach Division.

Announcement of the new panel-type vehicle providing room for eight rescue workers and some 150 pieces of emergency equipment was made by Philip J. Monahan, vice president of General Motors and general manager of GMC. He said the light-duty GMC is designed primarily for civil defense use in the event of a national emergency.

Monahan said that the special design and emergency equipment makes it invaluable in supplying fire-fighting, rescue work in floods, wind-tornado, earthquakes and other types of disasters, and in reconstruction operations in stricken areas.

With four-wheel drive and a 6,000-pound-capacity front winch, the GMC is geared to travel cross-country through deep mud, sand or drifted snow to reach its objective.

Two compartments behind the front seat, each with 75 cubic feet of space, have special containers for storing the emergency gear ranging from a portable resuscitator to tools for freeing persons trapped under debris.

A special roof rack holds stretchers and a 30-foot extension ladder. The GMC is powered by a 275-cubic-foot 6-cylinder engine developing 130 horsepower, and has a simplified gear shifting arrangement that changes it from two-to-four-wheel drive at the flick of a lever.

It is available with either Synchromesh or Hydra-Matic transmission.

For efficient operation through debris-littered areas and over all kinds of terrain, the GMC has auxiliary "helpers" springs and other rugged-duty features.

Michigan Counties Among Top In Apple Trees, Yield

Apple trees of all ages on United States farms in 1954 numbered 30,729,346, with 17,934,117, or 58.4 per cent, in 100 leading counties, according to 1954 Census of Agriculture figures for ranking counties released last week by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. Apples harvested amounted to 102,600,033 bushels in 1954, with 83,898,960 bushels in the 100 counties which led in number of apple trees.

The top 100 counties in number of apple trees in 1954 were distributed by states as follows: Michigan, 15; Virginia, 13; New York, 12; Pennsylvania, 10; Ohio, 5; New Jersey, North Carolina, Washington and West Virginia, 4 each; California, Idaho, Illinois, and New Mexico, 3 each; Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Oregon and Wisconsin, 2 each; Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Maryland, and Utah, 1 each.
