

YEAST DOUGH CAN BE STORED IN REFRIGERATOR VARIETY OF WAYS

With fall near at hand, appetites are soaring and homemakers find themselves preparing more baked goods. Here's a place where your refrigerator can serve you, suggests Michigan State University food specialists.

Any dough may be refrigerated if the amount of yeast is increased by one-half or doubled. Just put it in the refrigerator immediately after mixing and kneading, or let it rise, knead it down and refrigerate it. Brush the dough with melted fat and keep it well covered. Doughs can be kept at 45 to 50 degrees satisfactorily for three or four days.

To bake, remove the amount of dough needed, shape it as desired and let it stand at room temperature until light. Or let dough become light before shaping; then let it rise again and bake.

The specialists explain that refrigerated doughs are retarded doughs since the low temperature slows up the activity or growth of the yeast. When the dough is brought out to room temperature, it gradually begins to rise as the yeast becomes active again. A roll dough, a little richer and sweeter than plain bread dough, makes a good refrigerator dough.

CHILDREN DELIGHT IN HEARING STORIES TOLD BY PARENTS

Children are delighted with stories read to them, but may be even more delighted if you would tell them some.

You don't need to be an experienced storyteller to tell stories to your offspring. But you should be willing to give the story and child your attention while you're telling them, urges Betty Garlick, nursery school teacher at Michigan State University.

With your mind on the story, let yourself and your child be carried away by the story and you'll both love it. The big reason for telling stories instead of reading them is the closer contact between teller and listener. There is no book between you and the youngsters; you can watch their reactions and bring them back when they begin to "wander." You can see when they don't understand something or didn't hear it's easy then to clarify or repeat parts.

In telling stories there are more opportunities to build characterizations and a plot, explains the child development specialist. You can use your hands to show how tall you can give certain characters a facial expression (created especially for them) or your voice can help to indicate size or age of characters.

Most people tell stories when the need arises for a story and there isn't a book available. They tell it to have a story on the tip of your tongue, so think back to the good old days. Tell them of the trips to your grandmothers, or about the games you used to play. They like to hear about things that you have done with them, also; such as trips you took together, the day you cleaned the attic and found the old dolls or what you did for them when they were babies.

Slate Science Film At Baptist Church

Laboratory magic will crackle when the new film "Facts of Faith" is shown at the First Baptist Church, 33400 Shiloh Road, at 7:00 p.m. Sunday, September 27.

"Facts of Faith," produced by the Moody Institute of Science in Los Angeles, is the film version of "Sermons from Science." "Sermons from Science" is performed by top scientists from MIS for the armed forces, colleges, high schools, and other groups.

In the film, Dr. Irwin Moon, director of MIS, allows a million volts of electricity to sizzle through his body and out his fingertips, making long streaks of high-voltage lightning. He walks away alive.

There are other exciting demonstrations in "Facts of Faith." Dr. Moon fries an egg on a cold stove, breathes in a lunol of helium which changes his voice, floats metal rings in the air, breaks a drinking glass with a beam of sound, and captures the sound made by a piece of metal when a magnet is brought near.

Of course it's lots of fun to see these facts of science performed, but Dr. Moon does not do it just for fun. The more man learns in the field of science, he says, the more convinced he is that there is a creative Being who has the universe under control. It is only when men surrender themselves to God they find themselves — and reality, he said.

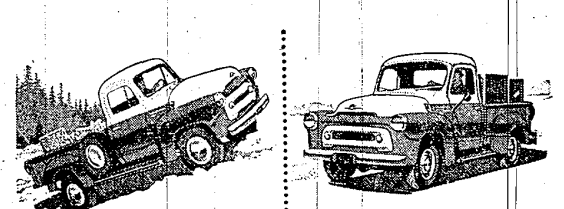
