Little League, Babe Ruth League Players Honored At Banquet Tuesday

Approximately 120 boys, along with their fathers and Little League and Babe Ruth League managers and coaches as well as other honored guests, were in attendance Tuesday evening at the annual Farmington Baseball for Boys banquet at the Farmington High School gymnasium.

Following the dinner, short talks were given by baseball dignitaries and officials of the Baseball for Boys organization, with trophies and awards being presented to the various championship members of teams this year. Boys receiving the age of 12, leaving Little League teams this year, were also presented with medals.

Winners of trophies in the Little League this year were members of the co-champion Farmington State Bank Tigers and Star Cutter Cub teams. Presented with an individual trophy for his outstanding performance in Little League was Darrell Allen. Allen not only completed the best pitching record in the league but was also a leading batter.

Being presented trophies as champions in the Babe Ruth League this year were members of the Team Trend Red Sox team. An individual trophy was presented to Cliff Simmons for his outstanding play during the past season. He led the league in batting and was also considered as the best pitcher in the circuit.

State Hunters Expected To Bag Million Pheasants

Unfavorable spring weather caused a 15 per cent drop in pheasant production, but hunters are expected to bag about 1,000,000 birds this fall if weather and other hunting conditions are normal.

Ralph L. Blouch, Conservation Department pheasant specialist, said studies indicate a 15 to 25 per cent decrease in the kill this year, compared to last year's excellent season.

Blouch said this decrease would place the kill between 900,000 and 1,050,000 - very close to the 1955 average of 1,000,000 birds bagged per year.

"This isn't too serious a decline and it probably will mean only a slightly poorer hunting season than 1955," Blouch said. "It should be about on the same level as 1951 through 1953."

These estimates are based on information from surveys by rural mail carriers, cooperating farmers and Conservation Department field men.

The recently-completed mail carrier census indicated the 15 per cent drop in production. The number and size of broods declined slightly and only 63 per cent of the hen pheasants had successful hatches, compared with a five-year average of about 70 per cent.

The large breeding population this year cushioned the drop in hen success, however, and kept the decline from reaching serious proportions.

Northwest YWCA Announces Teen Class Program

Teenagers this year will have an opportunity to enroll in a baby-sitting clinic at the Northwest YWCA, officials disclosed this week. The classes will be designed to teach girls techniques in amusing children, understanding the care of babies and children, and good etiquette and courtesies of a baby-sitter. Learning how to get jobs, set fees and knowing which jobs to accept or reject will be a part of the program offered.

The clinic will be held on five Wednesday afternoons from 4:00 to 5:00 p.m. and on five Friday mornings from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m.

On Saturday mornings, Northwest teen-age and junior girls are invited to participate in the YWCA's Saturday Recreation Program at Cody High School which will feature classes in swimming, crafts, fencing, and social, square and creative dancing. Girls may enroll in two or more of these classes.

Teenage and junior girls wishing to enroll in the swim classes will be divided according to their swimming ability. Synchronized swimming is featured for the more advanced swimmer. A swimmer's class for those who can swim 100 yards of all strokes will be held at 9:00 a.m. The intermediate swimmers will be divided into two groups according to swimming ability. There will also be two beginners' classes, one for girls who have not learned to swim and one for those who can swim 20 feet of the front crawl and elementary back stroke.

For those people wishing to enroll in the swim classes, a medical examination by the YWCA physician is required and can be scheduled by phoning Northwest YWCA for an appointment.

All classes will begin the week of September 24. For information regarding these classes and classes for adults call the Northwest Branch YWCA, KE. 3-6910, KE. 3-6326, KE. 3-3899.

Berrios, Chestnut To Fight Sept. 21

Miguel Rosa Berrios, the fiery little Puerto Rican featherweight contender, battles like Chestnut at the Olympia Friday night, September 21, in the opening headliner of the fall fight season in Detroit.

Berrios, five foot two of fistic dynamite, likes nothing as much as a good scrap. He is a swarming, aggressive youngster who is always prepared to take a punch to land one.

He is now ranked No. 6 among the contenders for Sandy Saddler's featherweight championship. In the past year he has registered six impressive wins, including a masterful triumph over Kid Elorde, the conqueror of Sandy Saddler.

Since Chestnut's explosive eight-round knockout over Carmelo Esposito, most of the featherweight title hopefuls have been resolutely staying out of his way.

"My ambition is to win the featherweight championship," says Berrios. "I'm confident that I can do it. But I'm not trying to get there by picking my spots. I think that's a mistake."

"I'll fight anybody, the tougher the better. If I can't beat them, I don't deserve a shot at the title."

Berrios has fought once a month this year, climaxing his steady improvement by beating Elorde on August 24.

"I just like to fight," he adds. "Chestnut is a good, tough scrap-fer. I'm not taking him lightly - but I know I can lick him."

Rare Whooping Cranes Number 27 in Nation

The latest census of the rare whooping crane indicates 27 of the big birds are still in existence in the nation, according to the federal Fish and Wildlife Service.

In 1942 there were only 15 whoopers, but the size of the flock increased to 34 in 1949-50. Despite efforts by conservation agencies to save the birds from extinction, natural losses and careless or malicious gunfire have held down the growth of the flock, which winters in Texas.
