EDUCATION MEET

The First Presbyterian Church on Woodward Avenue will be the scene for the Annual Fall Breakfast meeting of the Department of Religious Education of the Detroit Council of Churches on September 19. The breakfast will begin at 8:30 a.m., and will feature introductions and fellowship of the local, city-wide and state workers who have the responsibility of Christian Education.

A special address will be given by the new director of the Department of Religious Education of the Council of Churches, the Rev. Estel I. Odle, who recently came to Detroit to accept the position.

Mr. Odle comes to this new position from Indiana. He is a graduate of DePaul University and Boston University School of Theology. He served for ten years as a Methodist pastor in northwest Indiana, and for an additional ten years as executive secretary of the Conference Board of Education.
