Unfortunately, finding the source is not enough. Something can and must be done to actually make it a reality. This is where the singleness of purpose and spirit of cooperation comes in. According to officials, water can be available for the "dry area" of the Township by 1958, thus a great deal of work must be done quickly if the community is to take advantage of the opportunity. Only last week the City of Farmington and the Township of Southfield indicated that they might want to join in the project. This greatly increases the possibility of an early solution to the problem.

Occasionally the question comes up regarding the feasability of the Township getting into the "water business." In the case of the dry area, it is essential to the health and welfare of the citizens as well as the future development of the Township. In the case of new and existing systems, it is good business both from a financial and service standpoint. We do not mean to imply that the Township should immediately take over all existing systems. This must be accomplished gradually and by democratic processes. But we believe that it is an inevitable part of the over-all program of coordinating, supervising and improving water facilities and service in the entire Township. We, as a community, can not afford to stand still. We have too many advantages, opportunities and challenges before us. It is essential that we push on in pursuit of better things if we are to fulfill our responsibilities. Occasionally the question comes up regarding the

This new group will be given the responsibility of recommending ways and means of carrying out the suggestions outlined in the recently-completed Farmington Parking Survey. It was even proposed that a second committee be named to assist in locating additional sites for parking facilities.

As was pointed out in the recent survey, the lack of off-street parking facilities is the most serious road block in the path of the present and future development of the central business area. It is difficult to estimate how much business is being lost because of this condition, but it's sizable to say the least. This loss laffects not only the merchants, but the City and its residents as well.
