## DETROIT AREA SOCIAL SECURITY RECEIPTS HIGH

Nearly 20 per cent of the fami-  
lies in the metropolitan Detroit  
area have at least one member  
who receives some type of social  
security benefits, but public knowl-  
edge of this program is not wide-  
spread, according to a University  
of Michigan survey.

A representative cross section  
of 764 homes in Wayne, Macomb  
and Oakland Counties, the U-M  
Detroit Area Study found that ap-  
proximately 18 per cent of upper  
working class and middle class  
families had at least one person  
receiving social security benefits.  
A level "surprisingly high" by As-  
sociate Prof. Morris Janowitz of  
the U-M sociology department.  
The study results were reported  
recently by Professor Janowitz in  
"Social Work," a professional jour-  
nal.

This figure compared with some  
25 per cent of families in the low-  
er working class who had at least  
one member receiving payments  
from the old-age or survivors  
benefit program.

Only 26 per cent of those inter-  
viewed in the study knew that so-  
cial security included both an old-  
age and a survivor's benefit pro-  
gram, however. An additional 49  
per cent mentioned the old-age  
benefit only, while 3 per cent  
mentioned the survivor's benefit  
only.

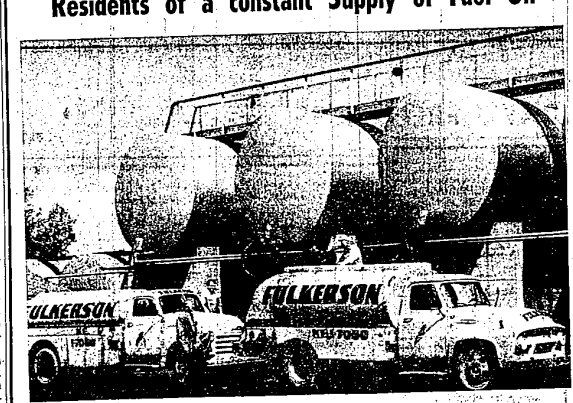
