



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PLAN BENEFIT RUMMAGE SALE FOR OCTOBER 3

Social Security Cover Many More Under New 1956 Act Amendments
 (This is the fourth in a series of articles on the 1956 Amendments to the Social Security Act.)
 In the preceding articles we discussed the disability payment at age 50 and the lowering of the retirement age on women to 62. In the 1956 Amendments Congress also provided that not only would the tax be reduced but also pay for the new disability program but more people would pay it.
 Who are the newly covered people? They are professional self-employed, hitherto not protected by social security — lawyers, dentists, chiropractors, veterinarians, osteopaths, and optometrists — everybody except doctors of medicine. They will be paying the social security with their income tax returns beginning this year. They will also need social security numbers.
 The new tax rate will begin in 1957. The social security tax on wage earners and employers is slated to go up 1/4 of one percent. That is to 2 1/4 percent of wages up to \$4200. Most self-employed will pay their tax bill early in 1958 when they will have to add 1/2 of one percent. This self-employed will pay 3 3/8 percent on net earnings between \$400 and \$4200. Other changes in the Social Security Act are more limited in scope. They include:
 1. Benefits for disabled, dependent children of retired or deceased wage earners. Applications cannot be accepted before October 1, 1956.
 2. Suspension of payment of benefits to aliens who leave the country for 6 months or more. This restriction will not apply if the alien worked ten years under social security or lived in this country 10 years, nor will it apply in countries which pay benefits to American citizens who return to the U.S.; and it will not be effective where existing treaties provide otherwise. This provision goes into force January 1, 1957.
 3. Denial of social security coverage for employment in any organization required to register as a Communist front, Communist action, or Communist infiltrated organization.
 4. Social security coverage for members of the Armed Forces beginning January 1.



State Forest Fire Losses Reported Light In 1956
 Fire control measures and frequent rainfall this year have combined to cut Michigan's forest fire losses by more than 65 percent below 1955 figures.
 The latest fires reported brought the year's total to 439 and boosted the damage figure to 2309 acres. Last year at this time, however, 6875 acres had been burned.
