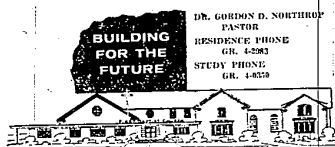

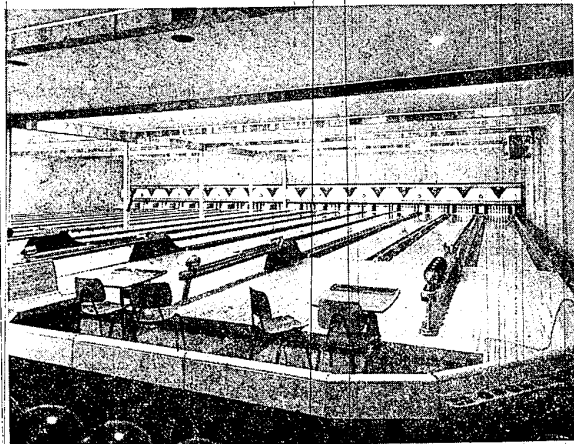

## Open House At Farmington Lanes Scheduled For Saturday, Sept. 29

Recreational facilities for young and old alike in Farmington have been greatly enhanced by the recent opening of the completely remodeled and greatly enlarged Farmington Lanes bowling alley at 32315 Grand River.

Formerly known as Farmington Recreation, the completely remodeled bowling alley will hold its formal Grand Opening celebration on Saturday, September 29.

The building will be open all day for inspection and bowling and a leading bowling figure will be on hand to give instructions and tips on the finer points of bowling.

Enlarged to double its former size, the building now covers an area of 12,000 square feet, permitting an additional eight alleys for a total of 18. Of great interest to bowlers is the fact that AMF Automatic Pinsetters have been installed on all alleys.

According to Delos Hamlin, owner of the recreation center, the automatic pinsetters provide complete accuracy and rapid settings without the use of pinsetters, eliminating the possibilities of delays and errors.

Walls in the interior of the building are in terrace green combined with natural and wood paneling to provide a refreshing atmosphere and lessen visual distractions for the bowlers. Accent colors have been attained in the use of gold in interior signs and chandeliers and white in the snack bar, a complete new feature of the alley. Refrigeration and heating units will permit the dispensing of hot and cold drinks and hot water in the snack bar.

Natural wood seating in contour design have replaced former wood benches at the alley. Wall-to-wall hanger installations now provide unlimited cloak space. Lounge and customer locker space has also been increased.

Strikingly modern in concept, contemporary times have been achieved by the use of plastic panel facings on the exterior of the former building. Combined with dark red face brick on the adjoining addition, a most effective exterior is produced. A canopy projection at the front of the new section of the building provides shade for the entrance.

On Sunday there are alleys open throughout the day and evening.

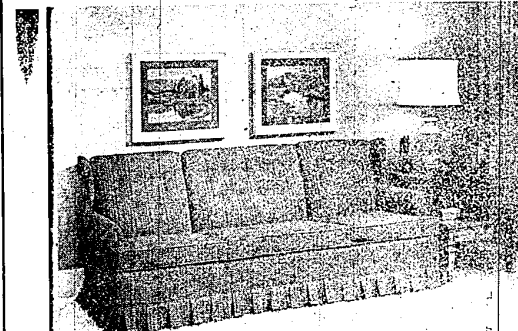
