size of the Kendallwood site where the need for next year is less definite. The preparation was instructed to prepare a report on the number of children now living in the area to be handled by the proposed new schools. A study of this report will be made at the next meeting of the Board.

Discussion on present policies regarding the use of school buildings by outside sources led to general agreement by members of the Board that a detailed study should be made. It was agreed that a set policy should be established and adhered to for all outside groups using school buildings, regardless of the nature of the use.

In other action, the date for final acceptance of bids for the construction of the new Junior High School was moved up to October 9 to October 16. In a separate resolution the National Board of Detroit was authorized to invest reserve school funds.

At the request of the Board School PTA, members of the Board agreed to attend the group's meeting on October 15 to speak on the topic of Farmington schools, present and future.

Requirements are as follows: (1) high academic standards, (2) basic general education, (3) adequate provision for women students, (4) recognition of women in administration and on the faculty, and (5) intellectual freedom for teaching and administrative staffs.

It should also be pointed out that each branch offers two types of membership. There is a national or voting membership which is open to only those holding an approved degree from an approved college or university.

The second type of membership is association membership or branch membership open to those having completed two full years or more toward an approved degree from an approved college or university.

City Criticized

(Continued from Page 1A) being constructed as part of the overall sewer program. Salley stated that the sewer is not being installed in the location agreed upon and that no manholes are included in the project. He requested that the sewer be placed in the easement at the rear of his lot instead of diagonally across the property.

SCHERFFIUS stated that, to the best of his knowledge, the line was being put in according to the plan approved by the State Health Department. At one point during the discussion, Mayor Pro-Tem V. O. Bates ruled both Mr. and Mrs. Salley out of order. He stated that it was the time of the city secured a new manager. Scherffius agreed to recheck the installation.

The clerk was authorized to contact the City members on the present Library Board and advise them of the Council's intention to transfer authority to the new sewer District Library Board. The date of the transfer will be coordinated with similar action by the Township Board. The Clerk was also directed to mail letters of appreciation to the members of the present Board commending them for their outstanding service to the community.

A copy of a letter from the Southfield Civic Association was read to the Council regarding the condition of Shawwassee Road as a result of the Interceptor installation. The original letter, directed to the Southfield Township Board, requested that action be taken to restore Shawwassee to its original condition. The letter was placed on file.

A petition, bearing 44 signatures, was presented to the Council requesting that a study be made of drainage conditions in the Bel-Aire Subdivision, and that corrective measures be taken if necessary. Scherffius stated that a survey is now being made of the condition based on the protests filed at the last meeting. He added that in view of the new petition which the study should be expanded. The Council agreed to delay action until the survey has been completed.

Scherffius submitted a recommendation to the Council that the Valleyview be extended to the west to connect with Valleyview Circle, and that steps be taken to open and improve the street. The Manager stated that the recommendation was based entirely on benefits to the city, however he added that the improvement would not, in his opinion, create any hardship on affected property owners. The Council accepted the recommendation and directed Scherffius to proceed.
