"Hunters Moon" To Highlight October Sky Attractions

October skies will be well supplied with moonlight as the Hunter's Moon appears on October 9, says University of Michigan astronomer, Hazel M. Losh.

"The full moon, which is the first full moon following the Harvest Moon in September, is a great boon for hunters, hence the name," Professor Losh comments. "A striking effect of October is the noticeable shortening of the days. 'Dropping from somewhat less than twelve hours at the beginning of the month,' the astronomer notes, 'the daylight period will last only about ten hours and 20 minutes by the end of the month.'"

Two meteor showers are scheduled for the month. Professor Losh points out. One will appear in the north around October 9, and the other in the east around October 22.



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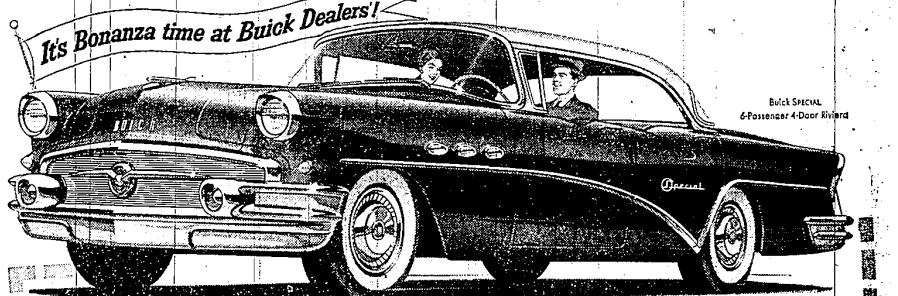
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
